"Afterwards Shamrock lost nothing in her windward work, in the reach she gained a little.

"On the last leg a heavy squall was brewing and both yachts pulled sails, but Resolute hung onto her club topsail while Shamrock pulled hers and later set a small working sail.

"The squall did not develop and the wind shifted from westerly to easterly several times and fell very light. On each occasion Resolute's luck was best. While luck was much against Shamrock it is doubtful whether today, she could have worked off her time allowance. It was good judgment on Mr. Burton's part to take in Shamrock's club topsail, as at this stage of the race it was impossible to work off her time without an accident to Resolute. Had a squall materialized this was quite possible with the latter swinging her topsail, while Shamrock snuggled down and prepared. She might have snatched a victory at the last moment."


