During the past week there has been

considerable increase movement in pota-
toes and for a few days the price went

to 38. Today dealers are paying \$2.75

and they are coming to market quite

freely at that price.

There is a slight slackening off in the

demand for hay and the price now offered

is \$18 per ton.

Large quantities of turnips continue to

come to market and they bring fifty

cents a barrel.

Butter is very much in demand and

the price offered by dealers is forty-seven

cents. Eggs are very scarce and

bring fifty-five cents a dozen.

Dressed pork brings eighteen cents

and chicken twenty-eight to thirty

cents a pound is being offered for fowl.

Jack Pickford in "Bill Apperson's
Boy" Stirred Emotions of People
Yesterday

A cynic has said that most people,
especially the women folk, do not thor-
oughly enjoy a book, a play or a mov-
ing picture story unless they can have a
little cry over it. There may be a great
deal of truth in this remark for nothing
sooths a tender heart more great-
fully than to give vent to stirred-up
emotions.

At the Imperial Theatre last evening
a charming little pastoral story of a
widower and his only child under the
title, "Bill Apperson's Boy," swept, as
it were, the large crowds in its emo-
tional power and carried them back to
the days of childhood, leaving again the
homestead spirit with its mother-love
