FIRST GAME OF THE SERIES TOMORROW

Vaughn and Mays or Ruth Likely Pitchers in Opening Game

Chicago, Sept. 2.—The Chicago Nationals returned from Pittsburgh today and began preliminary practice for the opening game of the world's series here tomorrow with the Boston Red Sox, champions of the American League. Ideal baseball weather is predicted. After a heart-to-heart talk with his men, Manager Mitchell ordered them to report at the American League grounds tomorrow for a practice session, in which the Cubs will acquaint themselves with the lights and shadows of the grounds. Charles A. Comiskey, president of the Chicago Americans, present world champions, has invited Manager Barrow to hold a practice session at the grounds on the arrival of the Red Sox, probably late today.

Jim Vaughn, a big southpaw, has been picked by Chicago sport writers as the probable choice of Manager Mitchell for the opening game, while the baseball rattle guesses that Boston's right-hander, Carl Mays, will start for the Red Sox with Ruth as second choice. Mays' peculiar submarine delivery, the like of which the National League champions have not met, has led fandom to believe that he will start of baseball's earliest championship game.

Ticket reservations for the games which in price will be the cheapest on record, have been far better than was anticipated, according to Walter Craighead, secretary of the Chicago Nationals. Two thousand box seats for tomorrow's game at \$3.50 each, war tax included, were placed on sale today and other sales for the following games will be held.

Several down-town ticket brokers have announced that the card boards would be available at their offices. Baseball men declare, however, that so far as they can learn no tickets have been sold to scalpers.

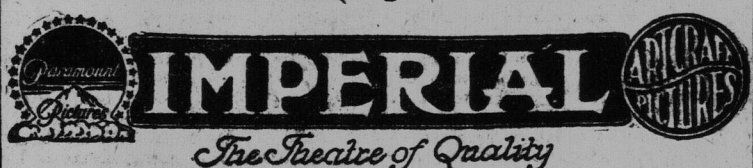
