In simple language and yet with dramatic
force Rev. J. A. McKelgan told at the
Every Day Club last evening Maurice
MacIntosh's story of The Blue Bird, or
the quest for happiness. It was sought for

ren had fled forth to seek it elsewhere.
Mr. McKelgan emphasized the lesson that
we find our greatest happiness in doing

our duty, and in following the example of

does not stand the test. The speaker drew
especially upon the home and its influence,
