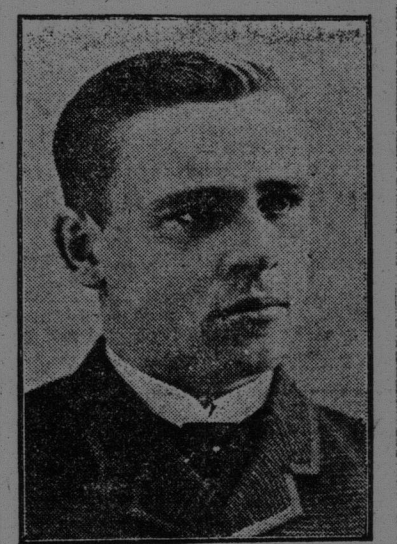

NOVA SCOTIAN HIGH UP IN TURKS' NAVY

C. D. Bucknam, Vice-Admiral of The Sultan's Fleet—Farm Boy Till Fourteen But Loved The Sea

Boston, Oct. 3.—Canada has a peculiar interest in the Turkish fleet. The vice-admiral of the Turkish fleet is Bucknam Pasha, who was born within seventy

miles of St. John. He resided in Boston at one time and has relatives here. It has been erroneously stated that he was born in Buckport, Me.

His Career

A relative, Albert Roscoe, of Waverley, furnishes the following sketch of his career.

"My nephew, Capt. Ramsford D. Bucknam, was born under the British flag, at West Halls Harbor, Kings County, N. S. His father was Ezra Bucknam, of West Halls Harbor, and his mother's maiden name was Isabel Roscoe, of East Halls Harbor. His grandfather, who was a very able and intelligent man, and a successful ship-builder, came to Halls Harbor from Buckport, Me., and his maternal grandfather, William A. Roscoe, was a native of Biltown, Kings County, N. S., and a sturdy, respectable farmer.

"The ancestors on both sides were of English and Scotch origin; not a few of them took their early lessons in seamanship, in those good old days of blood and plunder, when might made right, and the English pirates plundered the commerce of the world and carried their spoils to England, laying the foundation of England's greatness and her matchless navy. And her navy is still manned and captained by their descendants. So what wonder that Bucknam Pasha is a man of valor, ability and fight?

"Still he doubtless, like most great men, has outlived his antecedents. He has certainly risen to his present position from humble surroundings and adverse conditions through sheer force of character, inborn ability and fitness.

"It is not true that both Bucknam's parents died when he was a small boy. The facts are that his father left the family and went to sea, leaving the wife and four small children without means of support, and to be cared for by the relatives, a share of which fell to me.

"His father never returned, however, and some three years later was reported dead, which I have reasons to believe was not true. His mother, who married again and is Mrs. Isabelle Corbin, is living with her daughter at Emerson, Manitoba. For a few years after his father deserted them his grandfather, John Bucknam, moved to Manitoba, taking all the children with him, and he lived there on a farm till he was fourteen years old. But farm life was too tame for him; it did not satisfy him, and his love for the ocean and his restless and irrepressible spirit made his grandfather decide to let him go.

"So they fitted him out with the necessary clothing and \$50 in cash and he started for the great lakes.

"He has quite a number of near relatives in Nova Scotia, Maine, Illinois and Massachusetts, all of whom are very much interested in his welfare, and very proud of him. As I am the admiral's uncle, and his mother's elder brother, I am, of course, very intimately acquainted with his early life and can vouch for the facts so far as I have told you."

Daily Hints For the Cook

VELVET CAKES.

To one beaten egg add a tablespoon of soft butter, a cupful of milk, half a teaspoonful of salt and two cupfuls of flour in which has been sifted a teaspoonful of cream of tartar. Then stir in half a teaspoon of soda dissolved in hot water. Beat up until smooth and bake at once on a well greased hot griddle.

CRANBERRY PUDDING

One cup sugar, yolks of 2 eggs, 1 cup of sweet milk and nearly 2 cups of sifted flour, 1 teaspoon cream tartar and 3-4 teaspoon soda sifted into the flour, 1 large cup of cranberries cut in two pieces. Bake from one-half to three-quarters of an hour.

Sauce for same—Whites of 2 eggs beat on to a stiff froth, take 12 cup boiling water, 1 cup of sugar, 1 tablespoon of flour. Add a little cold water to the sugar and flour and pour into the boiling water. Cook till thickened, add teaspoon of lemon extract. Pour over the whites of eggs and beat well together.

WAS A BLIND VOTE AGAINST RECIPROCITY

(Montreal Witness).

A man came into our office the other day and said that he had just read the reciprocity agreement, and if he had done so before voting he would have voted for it. He had supposed from the paper that he had been reading that the agreement committed us to general reciprocity with the United States in manufactures as well as the things that were really in it, and that it meant annexation to that country. Another man, a Canadian, visiting Canada, said that his mind had been made up in favor of reciprocity by reading the arguments against it.

If nothing more relevant than these could be urged against it, it was surely a good thing for Canada. The same result had not followed with many intelligent people he had met. He had since got the agreement itself and read it, and he was convinced that not one of the many who had voted against it, with whom he had conversed, had any knowledge of it. They had given him such reasons for opposing it as that the Yankees would take away our wheat. When asked how they would take away our wheat without paying for it—and paying more than we are now getting—they had never thought of that. It would be our lumber or our hay or something else.

It would seem that, after all the campaign, the most of the voters had their only ideas of what they were voting about from newspapers and pamphlets that paid them the poor compliment of appealing to their sentiments rather than to their intelligence.

A correspondent says that anti-reciprocity papers never once gave their readers the facts of the arbitration agreement. We cannot corroborate this from knowledge, and the fact that their readers knew nothing about it is in these days no proof that they did not publish it. For such

Ithaca, N. Y., Oct. 3.—In his annual address to the students at the opening of the academic year at Cornell University, President Jacob Gould Schurman replied to the criticism of R. T. Crane, of Chicago, who called attention a few weeks ago to the alleged prevalence of intemperance among students.
