

The state of the process of the state of the May farmers are heavily in debt and cannot afford to buy pure bred stock or a large amount of grain to feed their cattle. Money is a scarce article and they are looking for a way to get more. Possibly they are in the dairy business and want to get some better stock to grade up, but they cannot raise a dollar to buy another animal. Sell some of your poorer cows for what they will bring and the hay that would keep them until spring. Take, this money and buy some grain with it say equal parts of bran or oats, cottenseed or linseed meal. Begin to feed each cow 4 or 5 lbs: of grain a day with clover hay, corn fodder and straw. Increase the ration gradually until each cow has all the grain that she can make use of, say 12 lbs. a day. The extra amount of milk will give you money to buy some more and will pay twice what the grain costs. Raise the heifer calves out of your best cows and get some others. Go to some neighbor who has been grading up with Jerseys, Guernseys, Holsteins or whatever you want and procure from him some of his heifer calves out of his best native cows. He will probably have all the high grades that he wants and be glad to let you have the half bloods. You can get these for about \$3 a piece when a week old. You may also be able to get a bull calf, but take nothing but a pure bred, no matter if he has not a gilt edge pedigree he will be better than a high grade. Next year get some more heifer calves the same way and the third year you will have some of your own.

Feed your calves 12 to 14 lbs. a day of

own.

Feed your calves 12 to 14 lbs. a day of whole milk until they are a week old when it may be partly skimmed. When a month old they may be given all skimmilk and about 8 qts. a day. Warm the milk to blood heat and give it to them three times a day. Fix a rack so you can put in some clover hay where the calves can pick at it and put up a box where you can feed them grain. Do not turn them out in a bare field or orchard but give them a little milk as long as you have it and keep them in a small yard with a clean shed or stable where they can get away from the flies and hot sun if it is in the summer. Handle your calves to make them gentle and you will have no trouble with them when they are cows. Keep them growing and feed a little grain all the while and breed them when 15 to 16 months old. Use the best aged bull that you can find and one that has by his heiters, proved himself to be a good one. There is hardly anyone but that is so situated that he cannot do this. It won't cost you any money to speak of and you will be making lots more in a short time. As you improve your dairy you will improve yourself, and the more you learn the more you will desire to know. You will soon begin to read more, to think more and find out for yourself other ways of improvement.—New England Homestead.

Italy Cousiders the Status of the Papery Finally Settled.

Rome, Nov. 28.—During a debate in the Chamber of Deputies today a member took occasion to allude to the agitation persistently maintained in certain quarters in favor of a restoration of the temporal power of the papacy, and said that such utterances showed the existence of a feeling that Italy's attitude toward the Vatican was not irrevocable. Such a feeling was a source of irritation and of possible danger, and should be banished by some official declaration on the subject.

In reply, Sig. Nicotera, minister of the interior stated that, regardless of what might be said and done inside or outside the country, Italy considers the question of the status of the papacy as having been finally settled.
