

Sabbath.

4. *Resolved*, that every minister preach at least during the year one sermon at every appointment on keeping the Lord's day holy.

Temperance.

Though we are persuaded by the earnest endeavors and the decided stand of the temperance workers of our country much was done in the past to subdue the use of strong drink, it is nevertheless a fact that nothing in the world is causing more unhappiness in families, more evil, and undermines the vitality of the Christian church, and sends more men into the pit than strong drink, therefore

1. *Resolved*, that we very much regret that on the part of our government it yet licenses such an institution, in a Christian land, to cause so much evil.
2. That we as a Conference stand shoulder to shoulder with God's help to work against the power of this enemy, and wherever there is opportunity to use our influence against it, especially encourage our members with us to keep the pledge made when joining the church.
3. That we admonish our members to assist in the prohibition of the liquor traffic.
4. That only unfermented wine be used for sacrament.
5. That we shun all party spirit in the election of representatives of the people, and to support only such men of whom we can expect prohibition.
6. That we discountenance the use of tobacco in all its forms.

Inasmuch as there is, according to reliable reports, an unlicensed bar in our parliament buildings at Ottawa, kept up at the expense of the country, being the means at times to cause disturbance, therefore be it
