GOLD FIND IN ENGLAND.

One Equal to That of the Rand Mines Said to Have Been Discovered

LONDON, Nov. 24--According to the Pall Mall Gazette, a gold discovery was made the past summer about two hundred miles from London. Hitherto the secret has been very closely guarded.
A report made by engineers declares that the ore vein extends from eight to ten miles, with a width of from six to fifteen feet. The engineers have no doubt that it is of great depth. The ore is identical with that found in the main vein of the Rand, and the prospects, it is declared, are as good as were those of the Rand. The report goes on to say: "The mine should be quite as good as the best belonging to the companies operating on the main reef of the Rand."
The ore averages eighty grains to the ton. A syndicate has been formed, with a capital of \$245,000, to work the find.

MILWAUKEE, Nov. 24--Samuel Levine, of Boston, Mass., who has a long record of crimes, was sentenced to eighteen months at the House of Correction by Judge Brazee today for passing a supposed check at the Milwaukee hotel. According to the local police the prisoner is wanted at Boston, Providence, Fall River, Lewiston, Portland, Rutland, New York and elsewhere because of forgeries.

MANIAC "MARTYR" SKIPS FROM ASYLUM.

WELLINGTON, Nov. 23--Zealand, Nov. 24--Lionel Terry, the Englishman, who was sentenced to death for the murder of a Chinaman has been discovered removed as inmate to Sunnyside Asylum, Christchurch, escaped yesterday.
It is believed that he obtained a key, and that friends were waiting outside to take him away. No trace of his whereabouts has been discovered. The crime for which Terry was tried and convicted is one of the most remarkable on record. He is said to belong to an old Kentish family and to have been educated at Eton and Oxford. He was for some time in the army, and then traveled abroad extensively.

His travels imbued him with the ideas of a "yellow peril" and he published a book on the subject called "The Shadow of the Empire," which dealt with the danger of the unrestricted admission of yellow races to British Columbia.

The book was published in New Zealand, but it failed to attract the attention which the author wished. He traveled in the United States, where he would have the work widely read at all costs, even if it involved "martyrdom."
He left his hotel one day in Wellington, and spying a Chinaman, walked down the opposite side of the street, drew a revolver and shot him dead. Then he walked calmly back to his hotel and awaited arrest. It told the police that he had shot a worthless Chinaman in order to draw public attention to a menace to the empire.

UP-TO-DATE BURGLAR.

LONDON, Nov. 23--A man named Harry Cullingham, who was arrested at Birmingham yesterday in connection with the attempted theft of a large quantity of silver from the premises of Messrs. Goody & Son, silversmiths, was found to be wearing thin kid gloves as a precaution against finger print evidence.

BURGLARS REJECT PLATE.

LONDON, Nov. 23--Upborne Manor, near Dorchester, the residence of Capt. the Hon. Oswald Digby, was the scene of a daring burglary early on Friday morning. A considerable sum in money, gold and silver articles and other property were stolen, but although the plate cupboard was quarantined nothing was taken from it.
