### **VANGEBORO** STATION BURNED

Along With the Gar Repair Shop.

Fire at a Late Hour Last Night Did Much Damage—Cause.

Lamp Explosion.

Between one and two o'clock Wednesday word was received here of the destruction by fire of the station and other buildings at Vanceboro. Few particulars could be learned, as both the C. P. R. and Western Union wires

at Vanceboro were burned. It appears that about a quarter to eleven a lamp in the American Express Company's office, which is in the station building, exploded, and soon the whole interior of the office was a mass of flames. There were many people about at the time, but in spite of their efforts it was soon seen that the station building was doomed.

From this the flames spread to the car repair shop nearby, and that building was all on fire when the burning of the wires cut off further communic ation. However, the message received would indicate that no other buildings were in great danger.

The Vanceboro station is owned by the Maine Central. It was quite a large wooden building, containing ticket and despatchers offices, two waiting rooms, customs house, express office and telegraph offices.

The car repair shop was only a small wooden building near the station, The message from Vanceboro added that the customs storehouse was burned, but whether this is a separate building or is included in the station is not known. The C. P. R. has no property at Vanceboro.
