

GERMANY SENDS GUNBOAT TO MOROCCO

Special despatches from Tangier says that a German force has landed at Agadir. This is not confirmed, but it is stated here that it is likely that the phase "for the present" in the official announcement of the despatch of the Panther implied that other war ships will be sent to Agadir later, if such action is justified. The German minister has informed the Moroccan government that the Panther will remain as long as Germany considers it necessary. There are some indications, according to the morning Post, that France and Great Britain have assented to the step which Germany has taken.
Baron Von Kiderlin-Waechter, secretary of state for foreign affairs, has gone on a short vacation, indicating that he does not consider the situation urgent. No disapproval has been voiced by the German newspapers, many of which are enthusiastic and believe that Germany should have intervened earlier.

English Press Opinion.

London, July 3.—Germany's intervention in Morocco is the subject of considerable comment, mostly disparaging concerning that country's action. The Standard says: "Bismarckian tactics still prevail in Wilhelm Strasse. No opportunity is lost in taking a political rival at a disadvantage. The desire which has been growing so fast among us lately to be on better terms with Germany, will suffer a serious setback."
The Morning Post says: "Germany has torn up the act of Algeiras. This was done absolutely without consultation or discussion with the other powers. Germany's interpretation is not made plain. The question only is how France and England will regard it. The peace of Europe we suspect, will not be disturbed."
The Daily Graphic says: "We warned our French friends that they were deluding themselves and that if they displayed conversation with Berlin a serious crisis was inevitable. The action of Germany precipitates a situation which is far graver than that preceding Algeiras."
The Daily Chronicle says that the situation in Morocco will not be improved by the action of Germany. With French troops in the interior, Spanish troops in the north and a German warship in the chief southern port, the situation may develop into a very ugly one. To prevent this, the Chronicle says, self-restraint on all sides will be necessary.

The Daily News says it was the incredibly short sighted French aggression, with the occupation of Fez, which was perpetrated in that brought about this result.


