Theodore Roosevelt, much worn by his experiences in the Brazilian jungles, where he had been delirious from fever, returned to New York and was taken to Oyster Bay on a special tug.

He has lost forty pounds, for he gained in weight on his twelve days' trip to this port. The returned traveler passed through a period of great convalescence from which he roused himself by force of will to his now hopeful convalescence. His face is much thinner, his clothes hang on him almost in festoons and he walks with a cane on account of the injuries sustained to his right leg in attempting to get a canoe.

Mr. Roosevelt's old fire and vigor flamed anew, however, when he reiterated that he had indeed explored a river and added it to the map of Brazil. He hurled back the aspersions of Henry Savage Landor and declared that he would make an answer to the British explorer who so adversely criticizes his announcement concerning the "River of Doubt," when he addresses the National Geographic Society next Tuesday evening in Washington.

laden sailing schooners which have been lying in Boston and Portland harbors for many weeks report it as almost impossible to obtain charters for their vessels, the situation at the Virginia coal ports being reported as dull beyond precedent. The six-master Alice M. Lawrence, which arrived here from Newport News on March 23, has been anchored in the lower harbor since she discharged cargo but is understood to have been engaged within a few days and will leave for a southern port as soon as the weather changes. Her sister ship, the Addie M. Lawrence, which arrived here a month later than the other, is still in the lower harbor unchartered. Several of the vessel owners, realizing the uncertainty of the market, have chartered their vessels for a year and probably in doing so have acted wisely. The Jane Palmer and Cora F. Cressy having been engaged to run for a year between Portland and Newport News, while the six-master Edward B. Winslow has a charter for 15 months to carry coal between Boston and Norfolk.

DANGERS TO NAVIGATION.

New York, May 23.—Str France (Fr) from Havre, reports May 20, lat 41 22, lon 50 27, saw four icebergs from two to eight miles north. Reported to the Hydrographic office. Str Genesee reports May 16, lat 40 44 N, lon 67 59 W, passed a spar standing upright and projecting about 10 feet out of water, with a small flag attached. May 18, in lat 39 21 N, lon 72 23 W, quantities of wreckage, consisting of part of deckhouse, planks, tables, boards, etc., were passed; lat 39 29 N, lon 72 22 W, what appeared to be part of a vessel's bow, with jib-boom broken off, and lat 38 28 N, lon 72 50 W, a piece of wreckage about 60 feet long, apparently a vessel's bulwarks.

AMONG THE FOX RANCHES

(Charlottetown Guardian) A rancher reports that he lost a number of young foxes when about two weeks old, and discovered that his ranch was infested with rats, and he thinks that possibly, as rats are very numerous this year—having in some cases taken young pigs from their mothers—they may have been responsible for the loss of the foxes, directly or indirectly. The suggestion is made in view of the above circumstances that it would be well for all ranchers to report, through the medium of the press, any such occurrence or anything they know that might throw light upon the matter of the cause of the death of young foxes.
