Ahmed, the Senussi leader,  
announced tonight by the war  
The forces of Zyed Ahmed  
near Glibra on Feb. 4, fled at

destroying tents and a large ammunition. They were pursued and ambushed in Munasib Pass, where the British force, as the announcement adds, by a force of 100 men, was completely and suddenly despatched to cut them off.

Zyed Ahmed, at the head of the main body, was compelled to turn back to the road and to strike southward into a waterless desert. The casualties on the British side were 200, including the Serassul and several other Turkish officers.
