London, Feb. 9.—The successful conclusion of the operations in Egypt against the main forces of Zyed Ahmed, the Senussi leader, is announced tonight by the war office. The forces of Zyed Ahmed routed near Gibra on Feb. 4, fled after destroying tents and a large amount or ammunition. They were pursued and ambushed in Munasib Pass, the announcement adds, by a force previously despatched to cut them off.

Zyed Ahmed, at the head of his main body, was compelled to abandon the road and to strike southward and a wateriess desert. The casualities of the Senussi totalled 200, including several Turkish officers.
