Tells the Work Being Done for Returning Soldiers and Their Dependents—Invites Dominion Council of Women to Meet Here.

Ottawa, March 13.—Like a true resident of St. John, ever out to boost the advantages of that city, Mrs. E. A. Smith came to the front at this afternoon's session of the executive of the Dominion Council of Women, with an invitation for the council to hold its 1920 meeting in St. John.

Mrs. Smith suggested that the council should visit St. John in September of that year as that, she said, was the month best adapted for displaying the scenic beauties of the city and river. Her invitation was received with much applause, and there is a strong probability it will be accepted. The council meets in Regina in June, 1919, and Mrs. Smith's invitation is the first that the council has received for 1920.

ECONOMIC FUTURE OF CANADA RECEIVING ATTENTION AT PARIS

The Dominion's Participation in the Lyons Fair Has Awakened the Interest of the French Industrial Leaders Towards This Country and a Greater Effort for Canadian Trade Will Be Made.

Paris, Mar. 12.—(Cable from Le Tropanier).—While the Canadian Ministers are busily engaged in terminating the work entrusted to them at the peace conference delegates, the economic future of Canada is occupying their attention and is being discussed at daily meetings.

The results which are anticipated as the outcome of Canada's British participation at the Lyons fair, have awakened the interest of the French industrial leaders towards Canada.

The recent visit to Paris of delegates of the Federation of British Industries, representing a membership of seventeen thousand firms, and the preliminary of a direct and durable accord between the British and French business men and producers, Canada is no less interested in such co-operation and the comments of the French press show signs on the part

of France of a policy with more advanced co-operation for the conquest of foreign markets.

Le Journal des Debats notes that before the war Great Britain was the best client of France, and this paper insists that in the interest of both countries such good relations should not only be maintained but extended. Are Canadian producers satisfied with the facilities extended them through the Franco-Canadian treaty for trade with France?

There seems to exist among Canadian business men here and there participating at the Lyons fair an impression that the French-Canadian treaty of 1907 was more favorable to France than to Canada.

Since the outbreak of the war and under the stimulus of war orders the exports of Canada to France have largely exceeded the imports from France, the respective totals being 14,278,335 and \$3,632,444 in 1914, compared with \$3,197,459 and \$2,341,507 in 1909.

ST. STEPHEN LOSES CITIZEN

Frank Todd, a Leading Business Man of Charlotte, Passed Away Yesterday.

St. Stephen, March 13.—St. Stephen has lost another of her most prominent and esteemed citizens in the death of Frank Todd, which occurred at his residence here this afternoon, at the advanced age of 75 years, from heart trouble. He had been in failing health for some time but had been about town and attending to business until a few weeks ago, and was able to drive out daily until last week. The deceased gentleman was the eldest son of the late Freeman H. Todd, one of the pioneer lumbermen of this section, and was born in St. Stephen, where all of his long and active life had been spent. He has been for many years a valued member of the board of school trustees of the town. He was a director of the St. Stephen Cemetery Company, and was for a time the president of the St. Stephen Bank. A man of great means his charitable deeds were many, but always so unobtrusively bestowed that none but the beneficiaries knew of them. His relaxation from business was found in hunting and fishing and he was widely known all over the province. His home life was ideal and in her great loss his aged widow has the sincere sympathy of the community. He was a member of the Unitarian church in Calais, and in politics a

ENGLAND'S AIR RECORD DURING THE WORLD WAR

Shot Down 8,000 Enemy Machines, While 2,800 British Machines Were Missing—Plans for the Future.

London, March 13.—During the war 8,000 enemy airplanes were shot down by the British air forces, while 2,800 British machines were missing. Brigadier General J. E. R. Seely announced in the House of Commons today, in introducing the army's air estimates of \$5,500,000 pounds. General Seely said that if the war had continued the estimate would have been \$2,200,000,000.

When the armistice was signed, he added, England was turning out 4,000 airplanes a month, and had 200 squadrons in commission compared to six at the beginning of the war.

General Seely said it was intended to keep 102 squadrons for defence, but that the country would not rely so much on the number of machines as in remaining in the forefront of aerial development. Air forces, he added, would be maintained in Egypt, Mesopotamia, Archangel and the near and middle east. He pointed out that political offices at Baghdad would be able, by airplane, to carry out in two days the same number of inspections in order to secure continuous friendly relations with the inhabitants as would by airplane, have taken two months.

General Seely said that a large part of the estimate would be available for the encouragement of civilian aviation.

The first duty of the new civilian branch of the air ministry, he continued, would be to secure an international agreement in Paris with regard to the future of flying, which must always, in many respects, be an international business, because there are no natural barriers.

Disputing on the enormous development in aviation, including the discovery of the wireless telephone by which aviators are able both to send and receive from the same operator, General Seely mentioned an entirely novel type of aircraft, which is under consideration and which, he said, mathematicians claimed could attain hitherto unheard-of speed.

Views Diverge Regarding the Guilty Parties

Unable to Agree Whether International or Military Tribunals Shall Judge the Violators of Nations' Rights.

Paris, March 13.—There is a divergence in the views of the members of the commission investigating the responsibility of the war on several important points, according to the Temps. As to whether the former German emperor, and other heads of enemy states should be brought to trial is a question on which a division of opinion exists, while the matter of an international tribunal, or military tribunals for the judging of those charged with violations of the rights of nations during the war, has not been settled.

The American delegations have opposed an international tribunal, pointing out that the United States was not a belligerent during the whole or a few ounces
