BRITISH DROVE THEM TO IT
Washington, Feb. 3.—Reductions in ocean freight rates made during the last ten days on cargoes carried in American flag vessels have been forced by British shipping interests, John H. Rosseter, director of the Shipping Board's division of operations, said tonight after reading a statement of A. B. Clegg, his assistant, in charge of the New York office that the cuts followed joint conferences between officials of both nations. Mr. Rosseter indicated that further reductions on the part of British shipowners were likely, and said they would be met "step by step."
"For many weeks, in an effort to stabilize freight rates, Mr. Rosseter said, "informal discussions were held with British shipping interests looking to reductions which would be satisfactory to all interests, including American manufacturers and producers, and the latter were naturally held in leading consideration. The informal conversations with the British Shipping interests never came to the point of actual conference, and finally terminated by the British transatlantic lines establishing very considerable reductions in rates, and this was followed by heavy reductions by British lines in the Indian and Oriental trades. These reductions were immediately met, and we will continue to meet them step by step, as well as making reductions in other trades where we find it necessary and desirable."

OBITUARY

Mrs. Agnes Connelly.
Apoahqui, Feb. 3.—During the evening hours of Jan. 30, at the residence of her son-in-law, Robert L. Moore, of Mechanics, Mrs. Agnes Connelly passed to her reward, at the age of 90 years.
Deceased was a daughter of the late Jeanette and James McKelchus, of Dumbarston, Scotland, where she was born on November 22, 1828. In her early womanhood she became the wife of the late Edward Connelly, of Belfast, Ireland, who predeceased her 21 years. Of the union, eleven children were born, eight of whom survive, viz.: (Agnie) Mrs. Martin Rae (Moncton); Jeanette; Mrs. Peter Smith, Nanaimo, B. C. (Mary) Mrs. Tobias Patterson, Eau Claire, Wis.; (Margaret) Mrs. Isaac Cooper, Pointe-au-Loup, N. B.; (Lucy) Mrs. Robert Parlee, Cedar Camp, (Lavinia) Mrs. R. L. Moore, Mechanics, (Annie) Mrs. J. Frederick Hickey, St. Salmon River, James P. Connelly, of Apoahqui. The remaining three who have gone before were two daughters in childhood, and the late Robert Connelly, manager of the Pelejoboc Lumber Co., of Great Salmon River.
To this estimable lady have also been born four grandsons and four granddaughters, of whom six are grand-children, of whom sixty-five grand-children and twenty-eight great grand-children survive.
The early years of her married life were spent in Dumbarston, Scotland, where the two eldest children were born.
In 1853 she, with her husband and family, removed to Canada and settled in St. John, where her husband was a master shipbuilder for many years. Later in life they removed to Penobscot, Kings County, and from there to Shipody Road where they resided until the death of the late Mr. Connelly.
Deceased since made her home with her daughter, Mrs. Robert L. Moore, of Mechanics, who has tenderly cared for her during her declining years. The late Mrs. Connelly was a very superior woman, and had retained her intellectual faculties to a remarkable degree. She had read much and possessed a very retentive mind, was an interesting conversationalist, well versed in the topics of the present as well as the past.
The funeral took place Saturday, after a short service, from the home of R. L. Moore, after which interment took place in the family lot in Meek cemetery. The flower laden casket was tenderly borne to the grave by six grandsons of the departed lady, viz.: W. E. Cooper, St. John, E. E.
