COMMON COUNCIL MEETS TO CONSIDER ESTIMATES

Estimates of Water and Sewerage and Light Department Discussed—Fire and Police Under Consideration—Harbor and Public Works This Morning

The common council had two meetings yesterday and will hold another this morning to consider the estimates for the coming year. At the morning session a delegation was heard in support of the proposed grant valued by the Victoria Harbor of \$100,000 and the estimates of the water and sewerage and light departments discussed. At the afternoon session the estimates of fire and police departments were under consideration, and this morning those of the harbor and public works departments will be submitted. The appropriation for lights was adopted but the others were held over for further consideration.

The water department is asking for \$30,000 more this year than last, the light department \$279,38 higher, the fire \$322,39 larger and the police \$297,60 less than that for 1920.

Start Extradition Of John Jenkins

Adjudgment in Charge of Alleged Theft is Granted for Two Weeks

Halifax, N.S., Jan. 10.—United States authorities, represented by W. J. O'Hearn, K. C., began extradition proceedings against John Jenkins, who is wanted in Bedford, Mass., on a charge of theft of jewelry, before Justice Wallace here this morning. After evidence relating to the arrest of the prisoner at Middleton, N.S., and his subsequent temporary escape at Windsor had been heard, Mr. O'Hearn asked for adjudgment of the case to allow time for depositions now in progress of preparation in Massachusetts to arrive here. Adjudgment for two weeks was granted.

Tries To Kill Two Officers in Dublin

Auto Was Riddled With Bullets and Drove Rapidly to Dublin Castle

Dublin, Jan. 10.—An attempt was made this morning to assassinate two officers, who, with the wife of one of them, were riding in a touring car in the outskirts of Dublin. The car was riddled with bullets, but the driver speeded up and escaped with his passengers, only one of the occupants of the machine, one of the officers, being wounded.

THE POLICE ESTIMATE
In the police department the appropriations for 1920 were \$110,512.66; the expenditures for the period were \$106,582.22. The appropriations for 1921 are as follows:—For the personnel of the department, \$99,700; for uniforms, light, heat, repairs, etc., \$12,965; with police revenue estimated at \$6,000. The cost of collecting and assessing is estimated at \$3,199.55, so that the police estimates for 1921 are \$109,564.81.
