MINORITY REPORT WILL BE MADE

International Regulation On Raw Materials.

Washington, Nov. 17.—Defeated in subcommittee of the international labor conference, Gino Baldesi, Italian workers' delegate intimates that he will submit a minority report to press forward his scheme for international regulation of the distribution of raw material as a specific for unemployment.

In subcommittee on a motion by E. Blcke Robertson, of Ottawa Mr. Baldesi was defeated by seven votes to four. The ground taken by Mr. Robertson's motion was that international regulation of the type proposed could not constitutionally or profitably be dealt with by the conference. On the same vote the subcommittee reached a like decision regarding proposals for the abolition of private ownership of land and property, the international regulation of ocean freight rates and choice between free trade and protection policies.

As a means for meeting the unemployment problem the subcommittee will recommend that "each state member of the permanent organization shall take measures with the intent of co-ordinating the letting out of contracts by the various public officials of the states concerned, as well as any work directly undertaken by these officials, and withholding same as much as unemployment and for districts most affected by such unemployment.

Germany on Way.

None of the committees being as yet ready to report, plenary sessions of the conference have been suspended till Wednesday. This afternoon's proceedings were purely formal. Announcement was made of telegraphic advice received that the German delegates would sail from Gothenburg by the steamship "Kookholm" on November 19. As the conference is expected to close on November 29, however, it is unlikely the Germans can be here in time. The Swiss minister at Washington, in fact, has been requested to notify the German Government to this effect.

The decision to end the conference on November 29 was taken because many of the European delegates had arranged to sail for home on December 3.

BRITISH PRESS DISAPPOINTED

LONDON, Nov. 18.—The morning newspapers express sharp disappointment with Premier Lloyd George's statement in the House of Commons yesterday regarding Great Britain's policy toward Russia.

The London Times says it is almost ashamed to comment on the debate "which went far to undermine the prestige of the British name in eastern Europe." The Telegraph says it awaits with misgiving the political consequences of a policy which means an immediate accession to prestige of the vilest tyranny in Europe. The Morning Post says Mr. Lloyd George announces, in fact, the defeat of the allies in the East.

U.F.O. MINISTERS GO TO PEOPLE IN SIX WEEKS

TORONTO, Nov. 18.—The provincial by-elections will be held late in December or the first week in January, according to the Prime Minister's statement. Premier Drury, Minister of Agriculture, Manning W. Doherty, who was defeated in Peel, and Attorney-General W. E. Roney will be the members of the Government to come before the electors for election, while the remainder of the Cabinet will seek re-election, according to the constitutional practice, as Ministers.

RESENT EMBARGO AGAINST CANADIAN CATTLE IN G. B.

Ottawa, Nov. 17.—The Federal Department of Agriculture has been advised that in a discussion taking place in the British House of Lords November 13 the President of the Board of Agriculture announced that his department had decided that it would be inadvisable to remove the present embargo upon the importation of Canadian store cattle into Great Britain.

The chief reason given was that owing to the war conditions there had been a grave increase in cattle diseases and the only way to combat this increase was for Britain to isolate herself in the matter of cattle shipments.

The meat shortage in Britain has now disappeared and it was considered inadvisable to increase Britain's cattle holdings this year at least.

It was feely admitted that Canada had a right to resent any implication that its Canadian cattle should be excluded because of disease, as Canada is exceptionally free from cattle disease.

WORKERS WANT THEIR MONEY

Ottawa, Nov. 17.—If another election comes on soon the Ontario Government will find it will have no persons ready to work-for it in recording the vote, and very few places at which polls may be held.

This statement was made to-night by William Burns, who was Chief Ennumerator for West Ottawa, and later Returning Officer for the riding in the Provincial elections and referendum.

Mr. Burns has been besieged by half a thousand indignant deputies poll clerks and householders who gave up their day or houses to the Government and have not received payment. Not in thirty years have election expenses been held up so long, and Mr. Burns has been forced to pay out hundreds of dollars to appease them.

TORONTO, Nov. 17.—Majorities

running from over 400,000 on the first question to nearly 250,000 on the fourth question were registered against all four questions of the recent prohibition referendum, according to figures compiled here to-day by Rev. Ben Spence, of the referendum committee.

Mr. Spence's figures are based on the official results furnished him directly by returning officers or secured by his agents from the returning officers in every constituency, with the exception of South Wellington.
