The committee has been unable to find new sources at present capable of being tapped, but will set to work to remove such tax anomalies which force one and two cart owners to pay licenses while owners of huge outfits escape scot-free.

### Woodstock Nurse Died.

Another death from influenza after an illness of less than a week's duration occurred in Woodstock hospital, Friday when Dora M. Hunter a well-known Ingersoll young lady, died, in her twenty-eighth year. She had been in training since January 1918 and was very highly esteemed. She was born in London, but had made her home with her uncle, Andrew Mitchell in Woodstock and Ingersoll since four years ago.

### Charge of Interfering

In Police Court this morning a sixteen year old boy appeared to make a settlement of the damages caused by him to the rink company's window on South Queen Street two weeks ago. Owing to another complaint which was brought up the case was adjourned until tomorrow. The complainant was made by the parents of a fourteen year old girl, who claim that the youth has been paying undue attention to the girl and used threats. This morning when asked about a bottle of iodine he had in his possession the boy said the purpose was to partake of it and to compel the girl to do the same unless she would acknowledge his attention.

### Plant for Southampton.

By a vote of 242 to 8 the people of Southampton carried a by-law to guarantee bonds for \$20,000 and otherwise aid the Sellers Kitchen Cabinet Co. of Canada. The chair factory here will be fitted up and manufacturing by the new company will commence at once.

### New Medical School For Western University.

A grant of \$150,000 toward the building of a new medical school in connection with Western University London will be asked of the Ontario Government by a deputation comprising the Board of Governors of the University which will wait on Premier Hearst on Wednesday. The city has voted \$100,000 to the new building which is proposed to be erected at the corner of Ottawa avenue and Waterloo street.

### Says C.N.R. is to be extended to Niagara.

That the Canadian National Railway Board intends to make an early start on a line from Toronto through Hamilton to the Niagara frontier is the assurance of D.B. Hanna, Chairman of the Board and General Manager of the C.N.R. lines in a telegram to A.C. Gardien, President of the Hamilton Board of Trade a Hamilton report says. Mr. Hanna sent the following telegram to Mr. Gardien in response to a request for information on this subject: "Your message of the 5th has been forwarded to me here. The Canadian Northern Railway acquired right of way to and through Hamilton for the construction of a line from Toronto through Hamilton to the Niagara frontier, and absolutely require the whole width of their right of way which we own through your city for our purposes. The Board of Directors of the Canadian National Railways are on record as approving of the early construction of this line, and arrangements are now under way to carry this out."
