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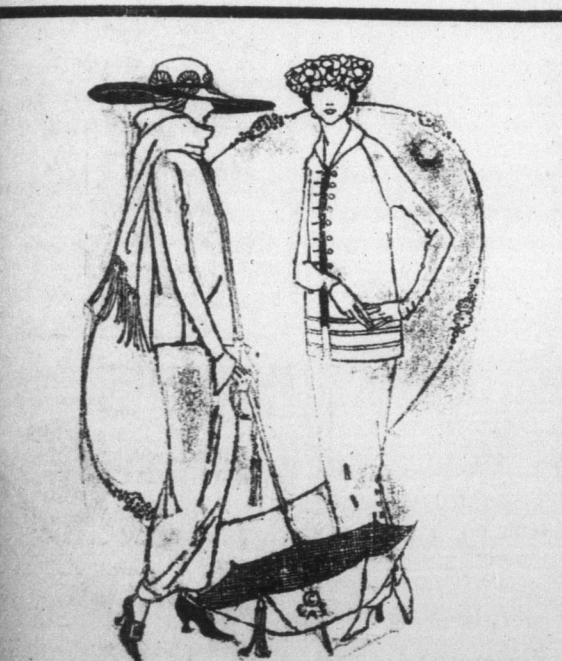

Organized Ball Lost In Supreme Court

Gloomy View by Ban Johnson If Appeal Is Not Entered

Washington, April 12.—Judgment for \$80,000 in favor of the Baltimore Federal League Baseball Club in its suit for \$900,000 damages against the American and National League and certain officers of the defunct Federal League was returned late today by a jury in the District of Columbia Supreme Court. As the suit was brought under the Sherman Antitrust Law, the damages will be trebled, making the amount \$240,000 if a final judgment is entered.

The jury deliberated about six hours. Immediately after the verdict was returned, counsel for organized baseball announced that an appeal would be taken to the District of Columbia Court of Appeals and, if necessary, to the United States Supreme Court. Organized baseball was charged with maintaining a monopoly of the baseball business in restraint of trade between the different States. The Baltimore Club alleged that it had been damaged to the extent of \$300,000 on account of the failure of the Federal League, and under the provisions of the Sherman Anti-trust Law it was entitled to three times this amount.

Reorganization of Game
Chicago, April 11.—Dissolution of the National Baseball Commission, the "Supreme Court" of organized baseball; absolute severance of relations with the National Association of Minor Leagues; division of the players' contracts eliminating the ten days and reserve clauses will be the probable result of the \$240,000 verdict granted the Baltimore Club of the Federal League by a jury in the District of Columbia Supreme Court yesterday.

"These revolutionary measures to safeguard baseball from all future legal attacks were forecast by Ban Johnson, President of the American League, upon his return from Washington to-night.

"The verdict, of course, is a blow to baseball," President Johnson said, "but we are not particularly distressed, as it was nothing more than we expected under the circumstances. We are bound to appeal, no matter what the amount of damages involved was.

"We do not want to be charged with operating in restraint of trade; neither do we want the charge of conducting a monopoly hanging over us. We can see a ray of sunshine because of the fact that we can appeal. If the verdict had been brought in our favor, we would have been denied that privilege."

What methods the American and National Leagues would adopt to govern themselves would be among the early developments, President Johnson said. The leagues would be obliged to conduct their affairs independently and the National Commission would have to be abolished if the verdict is sustained, he said.

Ottawa Man The New President

Extend invitation to British Bowlers to Tour Canada.
Toronto April 12.—The Dominion Lawn Bowling Association met at the Granite Club Toronto today. Mr. Dockie of Buffalo retiring president, was elected honorary president; Dr. Greenman of Guelph president; R. Farrow Ottawa, vice-president; Charles Knowles, secretary (re-elected). Dr. English and A.A. Langford attended as representatives from the W.O.B.A. There was considerable discussion as to whether the Dominion association should take over and conduct the Dominion bowling tournament which is now conducted by a Toronto committee. The general opinion was that the Dominion association should not conduct regular tournament as it was in reality intended to act as the executive of governing body of all the recognized associations and if deemed advisable, to conduct a championship tournament, the competition being between the different associations' representative teams on some plan to be devised.

The whole matter was referred to a special committee.

The matter of arranging the dates of the five association tournaments so as to distribute them better over the bowling season, was also discussed. The
