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ENGLAND

The House of Commons is debating the Greek crisis. There was strong criticism of the British Army's intervention in Greek affairs. Premier Churchill defended his Government's policy and demanded a vote of confidence.

CANADA

The House of Commons adjourned after a vote of confidence in the Government was upheld.

WESTERN FRONT

There has been no important change all along the line. Americans made small gains South East of HURTGEN, and in the SAARBRUCKEN area. The deepest penetration yet made by the Third Army has taken it to a point eight miles inside of Germany. The French Army continues to push northward toward the American Seventh Army, and the gap has been narrowed to thirty-two miles. On the British Canadian sector action was limited to patrol activity.

ITALY

The First Canadian Corps commanded by Laeut. - General Charles Foulkes is back in action and has scored a break through of the enemy lines between the LAMONE and MONTONE rivers, after three days of fierce fighting.

AIR

COLOGNE, or what is left of it, was hit with block

busters during the night.

Flying bombs fell on southern England during the night and at least two of the Robots were shot down by anti-aircraft fire.

EASTERN FRONT

Russian troups are making further progress in Western

Hungary.

GREECE

JAPAN

Street fighting is on a reduced scale. General Sir Maitland Wilson, declared to-day that the fighting in Greece was caused by irresponsible extremists., and that desserters from the German and Bulgarian armies had been found among the Greek partisans.
