chafe flaves on the Coafts of Africa, and they, their children and posterity, were declared the property of the purchasers, and of those to whom they were afterwards fold. That by the statute 30. Geo. 3. c. 27. made after the close of the late unhappy war, it is enacted, " That " from and after the 1st day of August, 1790, if any person or persons, " being fubjects of the Territories or Countries belonging to the U-" nited States of America, shall come from thence, together with " his or their family or families, to any of the Babama or Bermuda or " Somers Islands or to any part of the Province of Quebec, or Nova-" Scotia, or any of the Territories belonging to His Majefty in North-" America, for the purpole of reliding and fettling there, it shall be law-" ful for any fuch perion or perions, having first obtained a licence for " that purpose from the Governor, or in his absence from the Lieute-" nant Governor of the faid Islands, Colonies, or Plantations refpec-" tively to import into the fame in British ships, owned by His Majef-" ty's fubjects, and navigated according to Law, any negroes, household " furniture, utenfils of hufbandry, or cloathing free of duty." And it is " also enacted by the faid statute " that all fales or bargains for the fale of any negro, household furniture, utenfils of husbandry or cloath-" ing fo imported which shall be made within twelve calendar months " after the importation of the lame (except in cafe of the Bankruptcy " or death of the owner thereof) shall be null and void to all intents " and purpofes what loever."

That if any doubt remained before the passing of this Act whether flavery really, under any modification, existed in this Province, the Petitioners flatter themselves this statute expressly recognizes its existence in the fame manner as it prevailed in all His Majesty's Plantations in America before the late war.

That the Petitioners can affure this Houfe with confidence, that many faithful and loyal fubjects of mis-Majefty, after exposing their lives in his fervice, and facrificing almost the whole property they were pofleffed of in the late calamitous war, came into this Province with their flaves under the facred promise held out to them in the last mentioned statute, and from an idea lately gone abroad, that flavery does not exist in this country, have found that their flaves on whom was all their dependence.
