TALIAN VAGRANTS BOUND OVER TO KEEP THE PEACE

Charge of "Attempt" Falls in Police Court—Conviction for Vagrancy Against Rizzo and Walters—Italian Woman Expressed Fears for Her Safety—Story of the Letter.

From Tuesday's Daily... Francesco Walters and Alfredo Rizzo were yesterday afternoon let out on bonds for their good conduct and fined for vagrancy.
