CLOSER TO THE PEOPLE

These are days of great changes and the tendency is now and more towards the people.

Within a comparatively space of time China has become a public. The Young Turks have control in that country and in Turkey Balkan nations have freed themselves from the Turkish yoke.

The Old Land, although a monarchial rule, has with one exception, an hereditary House of Lords practically a Republic, but Upper Chamber has had its power so clipped that as one remarked, though they can grow, they die bite.

Without much doubt, with the lifetime of very many it will be turned into a popular chamber without regard to titles as such. In other words, the majority of the members now, will not get in there through the tomb of a progenitor.

In the United States also there has been a successful effort to have Senators elected by the people. Under the original constitution and the present moment the State Legislatures have each selected two Senators for a term of six years. The necessary three-fourths of the said State have now ratified the seven amendment to the constitution which provides for the direct election of Senators by the people. The change is quite sweeping and should be beneficial.

In Canada we are having trouble with our own Senate. The people have no say in the choice of members of that Chamber, and year after year the party leaders, the Grit majority threw much excellent legislation of Borden Government. Now it threatens to decapitate the Navy when it reaches them. This kind thing is intolerable and should be ended.

A man before becoming a Senator should have to run the gamut of the electors, and then at the end a specified number of years go to them either for endorsement or kick out. If the present irresponsible tamper with the Navy they will find that Borden will
