**BRUCE CO. TO GIVE**  
**\$4000 A MONTH**

Walkerton, Sept. 10.—Bruce County Council at a special meeting here yesterday unanimously granted \$4000 per month for patriotic purposes as long as the war lasts, thus increasing its previous grant of \$1,000 by 300 per cent. A strong deputation from all parts of the county waited upon the council in support of the grant.

Yesterday's meeting was the result of the work of a special committee appointed less than a month ago to further patriotic work throughout the county of which David Robertson, E. C. and George D. MacKay were the untiring chairman and secretary.

A feature of the meeting was the statement of Reeve John Joynt, if Lucknow that he had decided to give voluntarily \$1000 per year to the Canadian Patriotic Fund as long as the war lasts. Great enthusiasm prevailed, and it is expected that additional voluntary contributions throughout the county will bring Bruce county contributions up to its full proportion of the burden imposed by the war. As a number of the members of the Council represent a large German-speaking element the unanimous vote of the Council was particularly gratifying.

M. C. Reay, the Organizing Secretary of the Canadian Patriotic Fund, addressed the Council on behalf of support for the women and children of our soldiers who are fighting our battles.

**VALOR OF CANADIANS**  
**ON LIPS OF EUROPE**

Ottawa, Sept. 10.—"The stand which the Canadian troops made at St. Julien and their wonderful bravery is known all over Europe," said Abbe Perrin, Superior of the Canadian College at Rome, who is in Ottawa on a mission to the Papal Legate and Archbishop Gauthier. "I visited recently many small villages in both Italy and France. When the people found I was a Canadian they were most enthusiastic. They praised in the most eulogistic terms the Canadian troops, and I myself, just because I was a Canadian, was treated with the honor of a wounded soldier. The valor of the Canadians is on the lips of all Europe. I was proud, indeed, to be able to say I am a Canadian."

**WILSON AND**  
**ADVISERS ARE**  
**KEPT ACTIVE**

Consideration of the Latest Note on the Arabic Has Begun.

By Special Wire to the Courier.

Washington, Sept. 10.—President Wilson and his advisers began consideration to-day of Germany's note explaining the sinking of the White Star liner Arabic. The communication was understood to be of considerable length and there were no intimations of the time that would be required for determining the government's attitude.

While the text of the memorandum, as received from Berlin in press dispatches was published yesterday, officials refused to make any comment pending a complete study of the official note forwarded by Ambassador Gerard. The newspaper text which stated Germany had refused to admit obligation to pay indemnity for American lives lost, even if it should develop that the submarine commander was in error in thinking the Arabic meant to ram him, was widely commented upon. Previous dispatches had stated Germany would offer to submit the matter of reparation to The Hague. In this consideration of the new note President Wilson and Secretary Lansing give consideration to assurances recently expressed that German submarine commanders had been ordered to destroy no more liners without warning.
