FORM CENTRAL OFFICE FOR ALLIES' MUNITIONS Momentous Decision Reached at a Conference Held in London.

London, Nov. 25.—Albert Thomas the French Minister of Munitions, after a conference here yesterday with civil and military representatives of France, Russia, Italy and Great Britain, said: "Henceforth Britain and France will resemble two great industrial undertakings, which will result in the ceaseless production of the necessary armaments of war."

"But perhaps the most important feature of the conference is the decision to set up a permanent organization for the conduct of the munitions business of the allied powers. A central office has been established for the purpose of dealing with the orders given by one allied state to another."

"The conference is but the beginning of the work of co-ordination."
