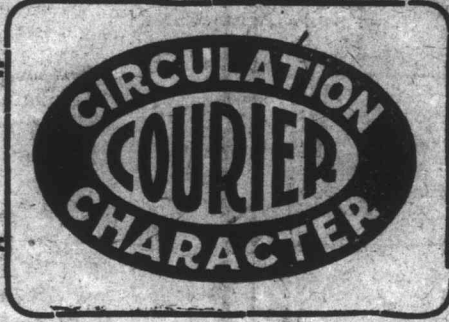

No Sausage, No Reichstag.
 Further light on one phase of the crisis is thrown by the Leipzig Volkszeitung:
 "The ultimatum which the representatives of the nation have presented to the central food authorities is 'No sausage, no Reichstag.'"
 The building in which those who presume to decide the fate of the people indulge in their everlasting nuddle is being deserted by large numbers of deputies, who are returning to their country homes as fast as the few available trains are able to convey them.

Why this parliamentary exodus? Because the sausage that was packed in their travelling trunks, when they left their native haunts for the capital is consumed, and as the authorities are unable to furnish them with fresh supplies, the worthy deputies, accustomed as they are to good living, are hurrying home to the footholds of the provinces.

To Save Wool Fat.
 The recovery of valuable fat remaining in wool used in washing wool is now being accomplished by means of a new machine resembling a cream separator. In the past various attempts to do this have not been satisfactory. The wash water runs directly into a bowl making 6,000 revolutions per minute, and the fat is separated almost instantly, a particularly pure product being obtained. It is discharged through an spout while out of another dirt and water are sludged. The machine handles 800 gallons of wash water per hour and can be operated for long runs with little attention.—Popular Mechanics.

Unwashed Pleasure Boats.
 Pleasure steamers have not shared in the prosperity which others have achieved through war. At an auction at the Baltic Exchange, London, the Thames paddle-steamer Royal Sovereign was bought for \$3,300 by a syndicate, who intend to convert the shipbuilding & engineering Co. by which the vessel was built in 1893 at a cost, it is understood, of about \$50,000.

The passenger paddle-steamer Kolt-noor, built at a similar cost, was bought, as she now lies in the Graveloch, by T. W. Ward, Ltd., shipbreakers, for \$6,200. The Kolt-noor is of 384 tons and was built in 1893; she is rather smaller and older, therefore, than the Royal Sovereign.

Crown Prince Called Down.
 "Some years before the war the German Crown Prince got a very neat, call-down from Miss Bertha Willard, a Philadelphia girl. It was during the Emperor's regatta, and the two mentioned were sitting with others on the deck of a yacht. A whiff of smoke from the prince's cigarette blowing into the young lady's face, a lieutenant near by remarked:
 "Smoke withers flowers."
 "It is no flower," said the prince, "it is a thistle."
 "Miss Willard raised her eyes a trifle.
 "In that case," she said, "I had better retire or I shall be devoured." The party was the point.

BATTLE AT YEKATERINOSLAV.
 By Courier Lensed Wire
 Moscow, Sunday, June 30.—(By The Associated Press)—A sanguinary battle is reported to have been fought at Yekaterinoslav, between German-Ukrainian white guards and peasants. The latter are said to number 200,000 and to be equipped with artillery and machine guns.

The factories in that region, it is said, are closing because the workmen are enlisting in guerrilla corps. The famine situation is becoming more serious in the Province of Tcherigov, in Little Russia.

Reports from the Caucasus say that several Armenian politicians have been shot in the Alexandropol district of Russian Armenia by order of the Turkish military commanders.

 An agreement between Britain and Turkey, by which all prisoners of war whose state of health permits their inclusion in the schedule of disabilities, are to be repatriated irrespective of number or rank, is reported.
