WOLFVILLE LEADS IN IMPORTANT EFFORT

To Utilize our Opportunities and Resources

Wolfville, Dec. 1.—Wolfville absorbs ideas, digests them and gives them new forms of expression. The latest illustration of this is the P. P. C. This being interpreted is the People's Planting Club.

The cost of living is continuously rising and there seems to be a growing scarcity of the commodities of life, at the same time as the war continues the demand upon our purses become more frequent and imperious. How can we turn deaf ears to the appeal? The Wolfville way of meeting the conditions is the People's Planting Club.

The idea is to secure plots of unoccupied and uncultivated land within the community limits to prepare this for seeding, to sow or plant staple crops. The work to be done by the voluntary labor of the citizens of Wolfville, who agree to spend as many hours in planting, cultivating and harvesting as may be necessary.

At the end of the season the crops are disposed of at current prices, the initial expenses are paid and the balance devoted to patriotic purposes.

The benefits of such a scheme as this are as follows: Were the plan carried out in all the communities of the Maritime Provinces, there would be a large in-

crease of the commodities usually regarded as staple; the cost of these articles would be reduced, the proceeds would be devoted to patriotic purposes, land in its appearance and productivity would be improved; there would be an increase of knowledge and health upon the part of the laborers who give their service voluntarily.

On Monday evening, December 11, a largely attended meeting of the citizens of Wolfville was held and after careful consideration the plan above outlined was in substance adopted. The following officers were appointed to carry the plan into execution:

President—J. D. Chambers. Vice president—T. L. Har-

vey. Secretary-treasurer—J. E. Hales.

Publicity Committee—J. F. Herbin, Rev. Geo. E. Miller, and Dr. H. T. DeWolfe.

Labor, plotting of land committee—H. E. Calkin, J. W. Vaughn, R. E. Burgess, Geo. E. Hicking, Dr. J. T. Roach.

It is purposed during the winter to secure the land, arrange for lectures and classes of instruction and secure supporters to pledge time and strength. A good beginning is made and the project starts well for success.
