**HOME RULE REJECTED**  
The House of Lords Throws Out the Famous Measure.  
**SALISBURY ENDS THE DEBATE.**  
A Memorial Scene in the Upper House  
The presence, strength and diplomatic tact of the House of Lords was demonstrated in a memorable scene in the Upper House on Monday night. The House had been sitting for several hours on the subject of Home Rule, and the debate had become very heated. The House was divided into two camps, the Unionists and the Home Rule advocates. The Unionists were led by Lord Salisbury, and the Home Rule advocates were led by Lord Rosebery. The debate was long and bitter, and the House was finally adjourned without having reached a decision.

**ROTS IN ENGLAND.**  
Striking Miners Come into Collision with Soldiers—Two Killed.  
London, Sept. 11.—During the rioting at Postleford, Yorkshire, the mob showered stones and other missiles upon a company of soldiers who were trying to put out a fire. A detachment of soldiers was sent to the scene and fired into the mob. One miner was killed and another mortally wounded. The rioters were on all night destroying property and fighting the military and police.  
The military throughout the district have called for more troops.  
At Hartley a magistrate was stoned and badly injured while reading the Riot Act. Troops were called for yesterday by the authorities as rioters had gathered near the town and the police were too weak to disperse them.  
Shortly after noon a mob of strikers began to pillage shops and taverns in the suburbs. The troops had not arrived, and the police were scattered by the rioters. The whole district around the town is now in the hands of the miners.  
Another death.  
London, Sept. 11.—Another of the strikers had died of wounds received in the rioting at Postleford last night. The strikers throughout Postleford are in a sullen and dangerous mood. Ugly mobs are being formed at several points despite the efforts of police and troops to disperse them.  
An Imperial Federationist.  
London, Sept. 11.—Col. Howard Vincent, M.P. for Sheffield, chief promoter of the United Empire Trade League, who intended to visit Canada a week later, has been prevented from doing so by the outbreak of the strike. He had planned to sail by the Lusitania last Saturday, but has changed his programme. Col. and Mrs. Howard Vincent will leave on the 21st inst. for Brazil and the Argentine. If circumstances permit they will cross the Andes, and ascend the Pico de Parana, in North America, return to Panama and the West Indies.

**THEY BLEW UP THE GAS**  
One Was Found Dead, the Other in an Unconscious Condition.  
**IGNORANCE IS AGAIN FATAL.**  
A Visitor to the Industrial Exhibition Asphyxiated in a Toronto Gasometer—He Did Not Know All About the Gas, But They Didn't.  
Toronto, Sept. 11.—One of the most shocking cases of asphyxiation occurred at the Pascook Hotel, in which William Outhwaite, a plasterer, of Shelburne, Ont., lost his life. The unfortunate man, together with Robert Carr, a farmer of the same place, came to Toronto to attend the Exhibition.  
About nine o'clock they visited the Pascook Hotel and engaged a room. The proprietor advised them how the gas was turned on and off. They stated that they knew all about it.  
Yesterday when they did not appear for breakfast the proprietor surmised that something was wrong and went to investigate, accompanied by Joseph Smith. As first they knocked at the bedroom door, and receiving no answer they forced it open by the door. The unfortunate man was found dead, and his companion was in an unconscious condition. Medical aid was immediately summoned, but only succeeded in bringing Carr around. Their efforts to resuscitate Outhwaite being unsuccessful, he was buried in the cemetery at 11 o'clock.  
Upon investigation it was found that the burner was open and had not been turned off. The unfortunate man had been told that the gas was turned on and off by a switch, but he had not seen the switch. It is thought that the man blew out the gas upon starting.

**LABOR'S PARLIAMENT.**  
Representative Workingmen Continue Their Session in Montreal.  
Officers Elected for Next Year—Union with Patronage of Industry Proposed—Amendments to the Electoral Act—Reduction in Postage Rates.  
Montreal, Sept. 11.—The Dominion Government will be asked by the Trades and Labor Congress to appoint a presidential commission to investigate the Dominion printing press at Ottawa; that women be given the same right to exercise the franchise on the same qualifications as that which men now vote.  
A committee was appointed to act with the Patrons of Industry for the purpose of carrying a scheme for a union to advance the interests of both bodies; that the Federal and Provincial Governments and municipalities be asked to give the right to give the printing and binding only to firms where the standard rate of wages is paid to the workmen; that the Dominion Government be requested to reduce the rate of postage to two cents and to one cent in all cities in the Dominion.  
A resolution was moved asking the Dominion Government to submit to popular vote the question of Imperial Federation, Canadian independence, political union with the United States.  
A resolution for Canadian independence was adopted by a large majority.  
At the afternoon session the secretary was instructed to have printed, and forwarded to the local bodies and report at the next Congress.  
The election of officers took place at two o'clock and resulted as follows: President—George T. Beale, of Toronto, by acclamation.  
Vice-President—P. S. Jolin, of Quebec, by acclamation.  
Secretary and Treasurer—George W. Dower, of Toronto, and Alex. Macdonald, of Ottawa.  
Mr. Laurier Sees the Falls.  
Niagara Falls, Ont., Sept. 11.—Hon. Wilfred Laurier arrived here on the return special train from Welland and drove to company with Mr. James Lowell, M.P., whose special train was well here, to Mr. Lowell's residence nestled in a clump of maple trees in the beautiful grounds of Drummondville. After his arrival there he retired and was up early yesterday morning and drove with Mr. and Mrs. Lowell to all the points of interest on both sides of the river, spending a good deal of the time in Victoria park. After luncheon he took the 3 p.m. Michigan Central train for St. Thomas, where he arrived at 7:30 p.m. and was met by Reformers called on Mr. Laurier to pay their respects to their great leader. His coming had long been known and was expected at the station when the train arrived, outside of the 100 that arrived with him. When he stepped out of the car those present gave him a hearty cheer.  
Smashup Near Dutton.  
Dutton, Ont., Sept. 11.—Yesterday morning two M.C.R. trains were badly wrecked. A freight train consisting mostly of heavy iron, on route to Detroit was badly demolished by a fast express train en route to Chicago, which ran into the freight train. The engine of the express was badly wrecked along with the baggage car. Both engines escaped by jumping the tracks but the freight train was slightly hurt. Four large cars were made into kindling wood. Soon after the wreck occurred the express train was stopped by the freight train which had the train moving again. All the passengers were badly shaken up, but happily no one was seriously hurt, which was a relief. All trains on the division are delayed.  
For a United Church.  
Ottawa, Sept. 11.—Arch-deacon Lander of St. Joseph's Church, Ottawa, on Monday took part in a big meeting called for Wednesday for the purpose of electing a committee to consider the Church of England in Canada. Bishops, representative clergy and laity from the Atlantic to the Pacific will be present. This movement has been before the Church for the last six years and has at last culminated in the calling together of the first national convention of the Church of Canada in the interest of the Church here by the only which will create in her general working in this country.

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
