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

Alberta News: Mr. Schulz, a ranch er near Calgary has a theory that by means of a small amount of cultivation the grass on the prairie can be made to grow about two weeks earlier than by the natural process. He observed that around gopher holes and other spots where the ground had been disturbed the grass is green in spring when everything else is brown. Last year he tried the experiment of harrowing a piece of prairie and found the results beyond his expectations. He came to the conclusion, however, that harrowing would be too expensive an operation, and he has therefore designed a special prairie cultivator. Mr. Schulz's device has been taken up by the McCormick people in the States and it is probable that in the near future a suitable cultivator for stimulating the prairie grass in the spring, will be on the market.
