The Duke of Abrussi's Expedition Penetrated Further North Than Nansen.

Christiania, Sept. 7. - A telegram from Tromsoe, Norway, in reporting the return of the Stella Polare, with the Duke of Abrussi's Arctic expedition on board, says the Stella Polare reached a point in latitude 86,33 north, thus penetrating farther north than Dr. Nansen's record.
