HAT STYLES

Magnificent Millinery Display at the Show Rooms of Thibodeau & Jacques.

There is nothing which will delight a woman more than millinery. Every woman who comes to the crowded with visitors who are anxious to see the latest creations in millinery art. Those who visited the splendid show rooms of Thibodeau & Jacques yesterday, the first day of their opening, could not but be pleased at the splendid showing which is there exhibited.

The show room is very appropriately decorated in white and green, and is a very charming effect. Misses Wrighton and Prescott, the head milliners, should feel very high-flattered at the success which has crowned their efforts.

The high class milliners are talking a great deal about this being a wonderful white season. Indications point strongly this way and we may look to see an enormous quantity of white hats and millinery. This year takes the form of cabochons, and other ideas of a similar nature. Sometimes strings are used which go around the hat and form the sole ornament of the crown.

One of the newest ideas is a whole crown of pearl beads. This crown is some six inches in diameter, and the rest of the hat is heavily draped with white chiffon.

The combination is most striking and the crown is not nearly so heavy as would be imagined. This style seems to have taken the place entirely of the jet crowns and other metallic effects of this order that ruled during the recent seasons.

One of the most popular forms of an unrelieved hat is, made of Chrysanthemum braid trimmed possibly by a little knot of ribbon or some other effect of this order. These are very striking and novel and for a woman who can wear them, most effective. As a rule these all red hats and in the smaller and medium sizes. Red and black, red and white, and red and yellow, are also very much seen.

Plainly trimmed hats for walking wear and other outing purposes, will enjoy a considerable amount of popularity. The tri-corner hat is everywhere, in the ready to wear, ready to trim, the pattern hat and the untrimmed shapes, this effect is prominent. In ready-to-wear hats the pure marquis is the leading idea in tri-corner styles, though some fanciful deviations are to

be noted. Triangular shaped turbans, as well as the three-corner roll brim effects that resemble the smaller sailor, are strong features.

A few novelties for the spring season are: Trimmings—Linen effects in plain, spotted and embroidered; Laces—Cut-out Chantilly, renaissance, Arab applique, Irish point, square mesh; ornaments—Pearl Cabochons, pearl buckles, pearl pins; Flowers—Mother of pearl roses, painted roses, velvet Edelweiss, novelty foliage, June roses, grapes; Ribbons—Printed warp novelties, taffeta Mousseline, Persian Effects, Spotted effects; Straw braid—The Mikado designs, the Chrysanthemum designs.

One very stylish hat, the Dolly Varden, called forth many complimentary remarks. It was made of grey and straw chiffon, draping of black and Arab lace applied on tulle over crown of delicate salmon roses. Black straw cabochons.

The Marquise is also a very popular hat. This is a good idea on the toque order. Ingenious facing made of circles of crinoline braid, the crown also being made in like manner. The draping is made of tuckled chiffon, through which is run very narrow straw braid.

One very fetching shape was the Louis XV., or postillion back, made of white straw, edged with black merveilles silk, drape of black Chantilly lace, large bunch of black silk violets.
