TO-DAY'S LATEST

The Right Rev. Mandell Creighton,
Bishop of London, is dead.

A serious outbreak of small-pox at
Watertown, N. Y., has been reported.

The Dominion convention to discuss
the question of tuberculosis will be
held in Ottawa on February 14.

The wall of the new drill hall being
constructed at Vancouver collapsed.
The mishap is attributed to severe
weather.

The Government has appointed a
commission to investigate the method
of inspecting grain at the port of
Montreal.

Mr. Justice Robertson, who is pre-
siding at the London Assizes, strongly
condemned the manner in which the
court house is ventilated.

The bye-election in South Winnipeg,
to fill the vacancy caused by the
resignation of Hugh John Macdonald,
will be held on the 31st inst.

The Niagara Falls, N.Y., gun squad
took part in the reception extended to
the men of Niagara Falls, Ont., who
have just returned from South Africa.

Lieut.-Col. Eggar cables the Militia
Department of Ottawa that Strath-
cona's Horse will sail from Cape Town
for Halifax on or about the 21st inst.

The Ottawa and New York Railway
Company, having completed their line
to Ottawa and established car-shops
there, ask for payment of the pro-
mised bonus of \$75,000.

The police at Nice have arrested
Prince Victor Nikolaevich, Russian,
on the charge of plotting to take the
life of the Emperor on the latter's sup-
posed approaching visit there.

The report of the Department of the
Interior shows that from January 1st
to June 30th, 1900, the immigration
arrivals in Canada totalled 23,895, and
of these 8,543 were from the United
States.

Major Septimus Denison, Royal
Canadian Regiment, has been appoint-
ed by the Duke of York to be his
Canadian Equerry on his staff to ac-
company him during his tour through
Canada.

At the inaugural meeting of the
city council of Kingston a deadlock
resulted over the contest for the
chairmanship of the board of works.
After a lengthy discussion the meet-
ing adjourned without having accom-
plished any business.

SHOT AS A REAITOR.

Craddock, Jan. 15.—It is reported from
Belmont that a man has been court-mar-
tialled and shot for supplying arms and
ammunition to unauthorized persons.

DEWET ANXIOUS TO SHOOT PAUL
BOTHAS.

Kroonstadt, Orange River Colony,
Monday January 14.—The success of the
burgher peace committee in dis-
tributing among the republicans Paul
Bothas' book, "From Boer to Boer,"
has injured De Wet, who it is
reported, swears he will shoot the au-
thor at the first opportunity.

The refugee camp is now occupied by
2,000 persons. Another is being formed
at Rheinstetter.

Supplies of all kinds in the towns
are shortening daily.

The Boers are most active north-
ward and also in the direction of Lind-
ley.
