THE TRUTH OF IT.

Since the discovery of oil in Raleigh the mineral rights of the Canada Company in certain lands situated in the oil regions is causing considerable excitement in some quarters. Farmers who have purchased land from the Canada Company find that they have no right to any benefits, if oil is found on their property. The news found its way into the columns of the Globe and the following is quoted from a despatch to that paper, dated from

"This company has a reserve clause in titles of land sold of mineral rights, and last session an attempt was made by Messrs. McColg. West Kent, and Auld, Essex, to have fixed the value of the clause as assessable property for the benefit of Toronto to the disgust of the farm- hearty congratulations. ers , who now suffer drilling on their land without profiting, the land being ruined."

This is the first intimation that Mr. McCoig ever interested himself in the matter, although it was reported that he assured some of the farmers around Tilbury that he had "fixed the thing up all right."

The matter was brought up at the last session by Mr. Auld, and upon an investigation by the Provincial Government it was found that they had no power to interfere in the matter. : The Canada Company's charter is a Federal one and while the Whitney Government sympathize with the farmers, they are powerless to do anything towards remedying the matter.

Just what will be the outcome is very hard to say. The farmers' only recourse seems to be to fight the Company in the courts. This would be an expensive undertaking, as the Canada Company is a powerful corpolration, and are by no means inclined to give up their mineral rights in these lands.

CONSERVATIVE NEEDS.

Conservative Leader Borden says by passion. there will be no party convention this year and hints at a general election next summer. If correct in the latter surmise, comments Phil. H. Bowyer in the Ridgetown Dominion, it means that the Conservative party will again face the electors without any clear-cut, defined policy on many of the questions that bulk large in the public mind. It means that the party will be unable to make united attack on the Ottawa Gov ernment, offering something definite to the people, but that there will be another helter-skelter scramble, every man for himself contest, with a different war-cry not only in each prowince but in each constituency, and the Conservative papers are long on noise and short on harmony.

The men in control of the country press mingle with the people-they attend all the local gatherings and learn directly what the people are thinking and saying. The city editors as a rule are tied to their desks and only meet the party politicians, civil servants and city clubmen. Keeping this in mind, which set of opinions should the leaders of a party heed? The party in Opposition to win must adopt an advanced platform.

How to Get Taper Fingers.

It is well to treat only one finger at the outset. When skill has been acquired in applying the bandage and if the results appear satisfactory one may extend the treatment. The bandage for each finger should be very narrow, about one inch in width. Un-bleached calico is a good material. It is essential to apply the bandage from finger tip to finger base, and if it is sufficiently long to allow its being brought over the back and palm of the hand and fastened at the wrist it may
