BEATEN IN LORDS.

Majority of 200 Against Government of the Education Bill.

Majority of 200 Against Government on the Education Bill.

London, Oct. 30.—The first vote in committee of the House of Lords on the education bill was taken last night and resulted in the defeat of the Government by a majority of 200.

The vote came on an amendment to the first clause in the bill. The amendment, which was offered by Lord Heneage, Liberal, makes religious instruction compulsory during a part of the daily school hours in all public elementary schools.

Earl Crewe, speaking for the Government, refused to accept the amendment, but after a most business-like debate, the amendment was carried, 256 to 56. The majority included the entire Opposition in the House of Lords with the exception of Lord Ampthill, who voted with the minority. Among the majority were the Archbishop of Canterbury, 20 bishops and the Duke of Devonshire.

Among the minority were all the peers who are members of the Government, and Lord Rosebery, the Duke of Manchester, the Earl of Durhampton, Lord Brassey, Lord Grimthorpe, Lord Weardale, Lord Haversham and Lord Rose.

TOLD NEWFOUNDLAND ALL.

Precise Details of Negotiations With U. S. For Modus Vivendi.

London, Oct. 30.—Answering a question in the House of Commons yesterday Winston Spencer Churchill, Under Secretary for the Colonial Office, gave precise details of the steps taken fully to inform the Government of Newfoundland of the course of the negotiations for a modus vivendi on the fisheries question. He said:

"The dicision of His Majesty's Government that a modus vivendi, was necessary and their intention to make proposals to the United States Government for such an arrangement was communicated to the Colonial Government telegraphically some days before the United States was informed.

"In the same telegram Newfoundland was asked to give her views of what form the modus vivendi should take, and no proposals were actually made to the United States Government until the reply of Newfoundland was received.

MANY TURNED OUT

Six Months In a Jail Too Much For a "Drunk."

Montreal, Oct. 30.—There has been a great jall delivery. Twenty-three drunkards have been let out of the Montreal jail, and a still greater number are to be let out of the Quebec

These men have been released on a writ of certorari, taken out by I. House, advocate, who took the grounds that the recorders had no right to sentence drunkards to such long terms as from six to nine months. The resuit of these long terms has been an overcrowding of the jails, so that about 50 of the prissioners had to be sent to Quebec.

Mr. House took a test case before His Lordship Judge Taschereau on the 15th inst., and he quashed the judgments given in the drunkenness and lottering cases by the recorders.

The resuit of the judgment will be far-reaching. Not only will a total of about a hundred drunkards and vagabonds be given their liberty, but this hundred has instructed Mr. House to sue the city, and the suits will be brought for amounts at the rate of \$2 a day for each day spent in prison.
