THE DUNDONALD INCIDENT

Says the Toronto Sunday World:—The nine days allotted to a wonder such as the Dundonald affair is about up, and except for occasional spasmodic interest, the matter from this out will hardly engage the attention of the public to such an extent as it has done during the past week. But the gravity in the situation has increased. On the contrary, the further we go the worse does it seem. The Liverpool Mercury in its comments has raised a new issue and in its opinion that the imperial government should have been consulted before the disciplinary action of the militia was taken, is a correct view. From the Mercury's point of view it would appear that the militia at Ottawa has been guilty of a somewhat similar offence to that charged against the Earl of Dundonald. The government at Ottawa has not been guilty of criticizing the acts of the imperial government, which it would doubtless do, however, if it inclined, but it has practically admitted an official who owed his appointment primarily to the war office in London and not to the militia department or to the department of agriculture at Ottawa.

No one will gainsay that the Earl of Dundonald was guilty of an indiscreet act in making his speech at the Montreal banquet; but he was acting under what he considered great provocation in having his recommendation discourteously rejected by a man whose knowledge of military matters compared with his own is as nothing by a man who was in office but for a few days and who, there is some ground for belief, was allowed to be there for the particular purpose that he effected. It has been hinted that if Lord Dundonald had complaint or grievance, being in the same building, he could easily have gone to the minister and laid the same before him. But his lordship had no knowledge of the course that was taken until it had been accomplished. It was not then for him to address himself to Mr. Fisher, whose term in office was of brief duration and who had snubbed and ignored him. It was rather for the minister of agriculture to consult the man who knew on such a subject than for the man who knew to go to him, after he had so bravely scratched out the appointment and initiated the scratching.

To ordinary people it will seem that the majority of the acts of discourtesy rest with the government. In the first place it was discourteous of Mr. Fisher to put his pen through Dr. Pickell's name without consulting or advising the real head of the department, or the commander-in-chief, on his proposed action. In the next place, it is apparent, as the Liverpool Mercury suggests, that a more becoming method of procedure would have been to consult the imperial government, whose appointees Lord Dundonald really was, before issuing a decree of dismissal. A delay of a day or two might have resulted, but the circumstances of the case would have been far better met. Again, it was excessively discourteous and insulting to a gallant, brave and earnest soldier to dismiss him in so churlish a manner without inviting his resignation. It is no apology for the Globe to argue that because Senator Baker, who has nothing to do with the case, had a grand-nephew, and other more or less distant relatives, on the regimental staff, therefore Mr. Fisher was justified in his act. In small communities inter-relationships and connections in the promotion of a regiment of volunteers are unavoidable. It is from the wealthy family and best known family that encouragement and aid must be sought in such an enterprise; and it is a good thing, and by no means one to be discouraged, if a whole family do exhibit a desire to serve their country and their King, whether they be all Tories or all Grigs, the latter being a consideration that should no more enter into the question of qualification of a soldier than the stripe of his religion.

If there is any room for doubt as to politics entering into this lamentable affair so far as Mr. Fisher is concerned, here surely is irrefragable proof that such is the case from his own mouthpiece, to wit, the Toronto Globe, which avows that he simply said in effect: Here is a squadron of strongly Conservative in the complexion of its officers that an impression will be created on the minds of the Liberals of the district which will be hurtful to the corps before it is born. You have made a gentleman major of the squadron whom the people of the section will recognize as having no political claims on the pos-

tion, and the conclusion will be irresistible that he owes his position to his prominence as a Conservative politician. Take that name out, therefore, or assign it to a lower position in the squadron, and you will afford less reason to arouse the suspicions of Liberals as to the composition of the regiment. That was virtually Mr. Fisher's position of the matter. Pertinent to these remarks it is surely in line to ask Mr. Fisher what right had he to assume that local Liberals were so shortsighted and narrow-minded as himself and wished to hold and enforce the doctrine that in a regiment of militia the balance of political complexion must be observed. Mr. Fisher might well ask, in face of such an argument as the Globe puts up on his behalf, to be saved from his friends. As we have before suggested it would be as well or as proper to insist upon the religious complexion, or racial complexion, of the regiment being equally divided as to insist upon the different parties being so. With starting inconsistency, after putting forth the plea here quoted, the Globe points out that if for political reasons—and mark you, there is no question here raised of military experience—Dr. Pickell was despatched, a Conservative was put in his place. Mr. Fisher of course had no idea in appointing John Mc. Gibson, who we are told is a possible political opponent of his, at the general election, of disarming him. A soft answer turneth away wrath and a gentle act discourages opposition.

The entire affair is of so disagreeable a nature that it is to be hoped the agitation and disturbance created will subside and disappear as rapidly as it came to the front, but that its effect will suddenly vanish is too much to expect, even though the Government has endeavored to point out that some effect by appointing General's Body Guard in this city a gentleman and a Conservative so splendidly equipped as William Hamilton Merritt.

AN OLD SERMON RECALLED.

Rev. Dr. Campbell, who created something of a sensation during the meeting of the Presbyterian General Assembly by resigning from the staff of the Presbyterian College, Montreal, and giving his reasons with considerable freedom to the press, was the centre of another sensation some years ago on account of a sermon he delivered to the graduating class of Queen's University, Kingston. The sermon itself brought him into considerable prominence. The sermon was reported fully in the newspapers at the time, and provoked a good deal of comment.

The subject was "The Perfect Book and the Perfect Father," and the plain meaning of it was this: That the revelation of God in the Old Testament is not the revelation of a perfect Father, and those who accept God as a perfect Father cannot accept the Old Testament as a perfect book. This, of course, was not stated in so many words, but it was the clear purport of the words that were used. "The prevailing Old Testament," that of an oriental monarch, subject to no law, ruling absolutely, sitting down upon the circle of the earth and looking down upon its grasshoppers beneath. A warrior king, he goes forth to fight for Israel against the rest of his children. A judge, he sits upon his throne, and the malefactors tremble before him, yes, and even the saints and holy angels, by hyperbole. An avenger, he takes the little ones of Babylon and dashes them against the stones.

This is the picture of God revealed by the Old Testament. It is not the revelation of God revealed by Jesus Christ. "Christ came to clear away the doubts and fears of the child-world, of the twilight of thought." In the New Testament God was no longer an imperator, judge, warrior, nor avenger. As revealed in Christ, he came among his disciples as one that served. He came not to be ministered unto, but to minister.

How are these two conceptions of God to be reconciled? Dr. Campbell frankly admitted the difficulty, and frankly urged the acceptance of the perfect Father at the expense of the perfect book. "It is of infinitely more importance," he said, "to believe in an infallible God than in an infallible book. The latter is vulgar idolatry, the worship and service of the creature more than the Creator who is blessed forever, Amen."

Prof. Campbell when taken to task for his sermon was able to explain away the dangerous parts sufficiently to escape the here's fate; but he apparently believes that the words have been treasured up against him to this day. His resignation from the staff of the Presbyterian College was the outcome of the promotion to the principalship of a former pupil of his own in the institution. As a matter of seniority he considered

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himself entitled to the position, and the fact that he was passed over he regarded as a personal slight. He has spoken freely of the matter, and has given ground to his enemies by phatic charge that methods were used to secure his defeat, such as are supposed to be more familiar to the politicians than to bodies of churchmen. He believes, too, that his sermon was remembered against him, and was in some measure responsible for the treatment accorded him.

It is not much wonder that the sermon aroused suspicion of Dr. Campbell's orthodoxy at the time it was delivered. The world has moved a little since, but even today such a discourse would be apt to have a disturbing effect. For, having been led so far by Prof. Campbell, how can the anxious searcher of the truth to stop there? If the Old Testament is not an infallible book what kind of a book is it? If it is not a perfect revelation of the Father, what is it? It is open to question in any respect, then there must be a human element in it, and who is to distinguish between what is human, and therefore liable to error, and what is divine, and infallible? Certainly not the Bible critics, for they cannot agree among themselves. It will be readily seen that the acceptance of Prof. Campbell's doctrine opens up a line of thought that is apt to carry one some distance from the old and well established path. And yet we are told that Prof. Campbell said no more than what many other ministers believe, but refrain from saying—Woodstock Express.

Lord Aylmer is to act temporarily as General Officer in Command now that the "forger" has been deposed. The officer who is to get the command is Col. Phaulst, the Deputy Minister of Militia, Le Canada, the Government organ in Montreal, says: "Why should we bring a foreigner here to command our militia when we have such distinguished officers as Col. Phaulst and others equally capable of discharging the duties of that position." The Colonel has been a distinguished fighter in the political field, and is well versed in party tactics.

The Montreal Witness doesn't like to express any opinion on the trouble between Lord Dundonald and the government; but it seems the opportunity to say this about the general officer commanding—

In Lord Dundonald the force has every confidence. Few among the generals who have commanded the Canadian militia held the same position in the esteem of all ranks. He is a hard worker with a clear conception of the objects he desires to achieve in making the militia as thoroughly efficient as the means at his disposal and the conditions of the country will admit. It must be gratifying to him to know that he possesses that esteem and that he has the assurance of the hearty co-operation of all the officers of the force in carrying out his plans for its improvement.

Township Councils.

RALEIGH COUNCIL.

The council of Raleigh township met on the 13th day of June, 1904. The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

Oliver Bailey served a notice of claim for damages on the 13th day of June, 1904. The amount of \$1,000.00 for damages to crops and lands by reason of the non-repair of the Johnston drain, from Lewis Huffman, that he had not been engaged by Dr. Bell, Mr. H. O. Lusk, and the family of S. Storey during the season they were quarantined for scarlet fever.

Robertson, clerk of the 7th division court, wrote stating that H. A. Lehigh had not paid his share of rent, \$4.50 for the year 1903—Ordered paid.

Edw. Dillon presented petitions to allow the following persons to commute their statute labor for a term of years: Lethbridge, Ed. Marshall, R. A. Marshall, and Geo. Perton.

The township submitted an application for a license to operate a creamery in the village of Chatham. Referred to the Board of Health.

W. G. McGee submitted a petition in reference to the concrete pipe placed in the drain, that he considered the pipe was not of sufficient size to admit the free flow of water, and that the iron pipe at the outlet should be replaced by a wooden one.

Mr. McGee moved by a wooden one, in reference to the concrete pipe, and recommended an opening of the drain at the outlet of the concrete pipe.

The report of Edw. Robinson breaking his truck at the bridge over the Waddick drain on the 11th day of June, 1904, was read and confirmed. The commissioner of division No. 4 recommended no action be taken.

E. A. Dillon reported that L. B. Marshall had completed his statute labor for which he would recommend he be allowed three years for the 1-2-2 and the 1-2-3, and that he had repaired a broken drain at the outlet of the Chinick drain at a cost of \$51.21 and charged \$30.00 for P. drain and \$15.21 to the Chinick drain.

He had a new bridge built over the Deary drain at 6th con. for \$30.25 and a bridge repaired over government drain No. 2 for \$198.00 and charged same to the respective drains.

Wm. H. Irwin reported that he had the bridge over government drain at a cost of \$198.00 and charged same to the government drain.

The bridge over the Carter drain on the 10th con. repaired at a cost of \$75.00 and also at the 9th con. for \$75.00 and charged same to the Carter drain.

Clayton submitted his report on the completion of the Toll drain. The proposed repair of the Toll drain, the Waddick drain was read and confirmed.

A petition was received from Thos. Bailey and 21 others for the council to abandon the 14th con. and agreeing to relieve the township of any damages they might receive by non-repair of that part of the drain.

The report of J. W. Shackleton, C. Centre road and Brady drain was read and confirmed. The report was read and confirmed. The estimated cost of the work being \$1,518.50, engineer's estimate \$1,518.50, etc., \$50.00.

In the matter of repairing and draining the town line along Huff's farm Mr. Irwin stated that Mr. Huff offered to put in a drain on an open drain on the west side of the road.

The treasurer, S. J. Harvey, addressed the increased work placed upon him by the council adopting the toll register system, and considered the arrears of keeping track of the toll should receive at least \$50.00 extra salary for performing this extra work.

Irwin-Stringer—That the treasurer's salary be increased by \$25.00 a year and the clerk prepare a by-law accordingly for next meeting—Carried.

Irwin-Stringer—That the report of W. G. McGee in reference to the toll register system be adopted and the clerk forward a copy to the commissioner of the Stewart drain—Carried.
