

"He was forty years old when he looked on geometry, which happened accidentally. Being in a gentleman's Mbrary, 'Euclid's Elements' lay open, and it was the forty-seventh proposition Lib. I, so he read the proposi-tion. 'By George,' says he, 'this is im-possible!' So he read the demonstration of it, which referred him back to another, which he also read, 'et sic deinceps," that at last he was demonstra-tively convinced of that truth. This made him in love with geometry,'

THEY WANT A REPUBLIC

Complete Overthrow of Russian Autocracy Is the Slogan.

Notwithstanding the Fact That the Suffrage Law Has Been Widened-Russian Cabinet, However, Leaves It to the National Assembly the Responsibility of Making It Universal-Will Have to Combine.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 27.—The new electoral law was gazetted yesterday and was accompanied by a statement explaining that in view of the fact that even some of the western counthat even some of the western countries did not possess universal suffrage the Cabinet could not assume the responsibility of decreeing it. The ultimate decision must be made by the National Assembly itself. The election list will be published forthwith, the date of the elections will then be announced and as soon as the Government receives notification that half the members are elected the National Assembly will be convoked.

Indirect System Retained.

The extension of the suffrage proclaimed yesterday applies especially to

claimed yesterday applies especially to the cities, where it is made almost uni-versal. Besides the workmen in the factories and mills, who are especially provided for, the suffrage will include every owner of real estate, paying taxes, persons conducting enterprises, like shop keepers paying licenses; persons paying a lodging tax or occupying separate lodgings and persons in the Government service, including rallroadmen. All limit of rent paid by lodgings holders as a voting qualification is removed. The indirect system of two degrees of voters in both cities and country is retained.

Combine to Win.

A new feature of the law is that the workmen, instead of being allowed a every owner of real estate, paying tax-

A new feature of the law is that the workmen, instead of being allowed a specified number of class representatives have to take their chances in the electoral colleges with the other classes. Moreover, instead of the cities having representatives, the electoral colleges will be composed by the provinces. The workmen will choose an electoral three colleges will be composed by the provinces. vinces. The workmen will choose an elector for every 10,000 men. The result is shown in the case of the Province of St. Petersburg, where the electoral college will contain 14 peasant electors, 18 landlords, 15 city landlords and 24 workmen

and 24 workmen.

By this method, while the workmen's electors are the largest class, they will only be able to elect representatives in combination. It contains elements which certainly will appeal to conservative opinion, but with the slogan of "universal suffrage" ringing in the popular ear it will prove a great disappointment and is certain to furnish the proletariat organizations with a new wea pon for agitation.

London, Dec. 27.—The St. Petersburg correspondent of The Times in a despatch dated Dec. 26 says:

"Governor-General Doubassoff, telegraphing yesterday, reported that 15,000 persons had been killed or wounded at Moscow.

"The latest news from Moscow says that the first regiment of the Don Cossacks, the Tver Dragoons and the Nesvizh Regiment of Infantry mutinied and are confined to their barracks.
"I am informed from a good source that 2,000 persons were killed, and 10,000 wounded. The revolutionists are making no headway, but they show no signs of exhaustion."

Moscow Revolt Fails.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 27.—Emperor Nicholas and Count Witte received last night a report from Gen Doubas-soff, Governor-General of Moscow, saying that the revolt there had failed, that the military had the situation in hand, and that whatever defection may have existed among the troops had been overcome by attacks on them with bombs and revolvers, to which they had been subjected from the windows and roofs of houses, and which had so enraged them that they could hardly be restrained.

Has Them Cornered. Has Them Cornered.

Shortly before 9 o'clock last night the correspondent of the Associated Press at Moscow telephoned that there seemed to be no longer doubt that the insurrection was collapsing. The insurgents still held the quadrangle in which the workmen's council was sitting as a revolutionary committee, but only because Governor-General Doubassoff was not yet ready to give the council expanse.

bassoff was not yet ready to give the coup de grace.

Firing continued intermittently throughout the day. At 5 o'clock automatic guns were being used in Strastner square, but the insurgents were becoming exhausted after their four days' efforts, and the fighting was rapidly degenerating into guerrilla warfare.

Gen Doubassoff has enforced the most rigid martial law, and no person is allowed on the streets after 9 o'clock at night.

Among the lower classes which do not sympathize with the desire to overthrow the Emperor, the feeling is becoming intense, and in many cases strikers have been heaten to death. The correspondent predicts that the crushing of the rebellion is likely to be followed by the most horrible atrocities if the "black hundreds" are let loose.
