## BUSY SESSION OF COUNCIL

passed that no civic official be granted an increase in salary after the appointments had been accepted.

Ald. Stone—But Dr. Hall has not accepted the appointment.

Ald. Potter wanted to know whether the Finance committee had gone into the matter thoroughly, and as to whether they had found that the M. H. O.'s duties warranted the increase.

Ald. Scullard replied that they had, and that the duties of the M. H. O. were among the most important of those of any of the city officials.

Ald. Austin thought that the duties of the M. H. O. were too onerous for the present remuneration. The present salary had been fixed when conditions were much different from those of the present time.

Ald. Stone drew attention to the fact that other cities were paying higher salaries to their Medical Health Officers.

Ald. Edmondson still objected to the increase, partly on the grounds that the officer's duties were not such as should warrant a salary of \$200 per year. He stated he was lightened by the Sanitary Inspector, who relieved him of all the heavier work.

Besides he was of the opinion that too much money was being spent on the health department. No other department was eating up so much of the city's good cash. Accounts from the health department were constantly being brought before the Council, and he stated that hundreds of dollars had been expended last year on an isolation hospital, which had later to be done away with.

Ald. Austin—The result is, that we have one of the most healthy cities in the Province.

Ald. Edmondson—That's because the people are clean and take care of themselves.

When the motion to adopt the clause was carried, Ald. Edmondson asked for the yeas and nays.

Ald. Edmondson was the only alderman who put himself on record as being against the increase.
