Editorial Brevities.

The executive of the Red Cross Society of Regina has asked that the Food Controller's advice be carefully observed at any gatherings in the interests of the Red Cross and that if the business really wishes to serve food she should at least be careful not to use the commodities most needed overseas.

Wolfville is not the only place where churches of different denominations are uniting in order to conserve the fuel supply. The Cooke Presbyterian church and the Brock street Methodist church, at Kingston, Ontario, have joined forces and will worship one Sunday in one church and the next Sunday in the other. A wider adoption of this plan would do more than conserve coal. It would promote a better religious feeling and aid in making the churches more efficient.

Daylight saving, approved by the Senate of the United States and favorably reported to the House, is almost certain to become a fact in the neighboring republic. That Canada will follow the lead of the United States in this matter is plainly indicated by the fact that the Canadian government is known to be negotiating with the American government on the subject. The only real objection to daylight saving has been the lack of unity of action. A general bill will remove the difficulty and give all the full benefit of the advantage of more daylight.

Another Hero.

That dreaded telegram that brings so much sad news was received on Feb. 7th by Mrs. F. A. Masters, of Kentville, conveying the news of the death of her son, Pte. J. C. Duncan. Joe, as he was familiarly known, graduated from Acadia Collegiate Academy in 1911, entering the Royal Bank at Wolfville immediately after, where he remained three years. He was transferred to Prince Edward Island and later to St. John, where he enlisted in 115th batt. He went overseas July, 1916. After training in England he volunteered to reinforce the 13th batt. of Montreal, crossed to France Dec. 13th, 1916, and came through the engagement at Vimy Ridge without a scratch. He was finally wounded Sept. 15th. For a time his condition was rather serious, but in November he began to show signs of recovery and hopes were entertained until after Christmas, when complications set in. His last letter to his mother—Jan. 14th—told her he was feeling much better, but on Jan. 17th a telegram arrived with the news that he was again dangerously ill, and later the one which brought the news of his death.

Bean Growing in Nova Scotia.

The second food production bulletin published by the Agricultural Resources Committee, of Nova Scotia, has just been sent out. It is by Prof. P. J. Shaw, on Bean Growing in N.S. It is cleverly written and full of valuable information. An appendix on Cooking Beans, by Miss Jessie A. Fraser, will be of interest to the housewife. The pamphlet can be had from the Truro Agricultural College.
