The Terms of Surrender of Fiume and D'Annunzio

ROME, Dec. 31.—The terms of the surrender of Fiume provided for D'Annunzio's leaving the city after his release of the legionaries from their oath, the restoration of all prisoners made by legionaries, surrender of all arms, ammunitions and stores appropriated, all warships to leave Fiume, all legionaries not natives of Fiume to leave the town within five days.

TWOPARLIAMENTS WORKING WITHIN SIX MONTHS

Sir Hamar Greenwood Looks Forward to Amicable Settlement of Irish Question

LONDON, Jan. 1.—"Within six months two powerful Parliaments will be working in Ireland for an amicable settlement of the question which has caused much ill-feeling and misunderstanding between Great Britain and the United States, and this will be opened the happiest chapter in the history of the English speaking people of the world," said Sir Hamar Greenwood last night at a farewell dinner to the Cornell Cross-Country Runners. The statement is considered to be the official view of the passage of the Home Rule Bill, namely that the South of Ireland would accept the bill and work toward a harmonious union with Britain.

CONSTANTINE IS WORRYING NOW

Also Suffering From a Painful Threat.

ATHENS, Jan. 2.—The vote of the army in Smyrna in the recent elections has been announced by the court of election. The decision means material alterations in the complexion of the Chamber of Deputies, lessening the number of Venizelists. Constantine is suffering from a painful sore throat, but his condition is not serious. He is worrying much over the allied viewpoint on his return to power.

Halifax Tragedy In Which Two Are Killed

HALIFAX, Jan. 2.—James Terrell, K.C., well-known Halifax lawyer and Captain James Adams of the cable ship Lord Kelvin were killed instantly Saturday night when the auto in which they were driving collided with inward bound Maritime express running about three hours late, at Read Crossing near Bedford railway station. The two men left Halifax about four o'clock in Terrell's closed Ford Sedan. They went out Bedford Road and next thing friends in Halifax heard about them was that they had been killed. They had supper at Capt. Atwood's residence and were returning to the city. The auto was smashed and the bodies of both men badly mangled. Capt. Adams was fifty six and Terrell, who was a member of a prominent English family and lived in Halifax. Both are married and leave families.

BOSTON PLANTS REDUCE WAGES

Rubber Co. Will Run Only Two Days a Week.

BOSTON, Jan. 1.—The reduction of the Boston navy yard working force to the pre-war basis on account of lack of funds will amount to forty per cent, and the number let go will reach nearly one thousand.

BOSTON, Jan. 1.—Notices were posted by the Tyer Rubber Co., of Andover, Mass., Thursday, that the plant will run only two days a week until further notice. It has five hundred employees.

The Military Governor Ordered Houses Burnt

Order Came as Result of Ambush on Police

CORK, Jan. 2.—Seven houses in nearby towns and their contents were burned by the military last night as result of an ambush on police near Middleton, it was announced here to-day. The story of the incident was related in a statement issued by the military authorities in Cork. "As a result of an ambush on the police at Middleton and near Globe Houses," it stated, "the military governor decided that certain houses in the vicinity of the theatre should be destroyed as the inhabitants were bound to have known of the ambush. The houses of the following were destroyed between the hours of three and six p.m., John O'Shea, Paul McCarthy and Edward Casey, Middleton; Samuel Cotter and Mr. Donevan, Ballydan; and Michael Dorgan and Ahearn, Griffin. A notice was handed to each of the above persons stating why the houses were destroyed. Each resident was given an hour to remove valuables, but no furniture, and the houses were then destroyed. Nothing apart from the houses and furniture were destroyed.

POLICE PATROL IS FIRED UPON

Scrap Results In Death of a Constable.

BERLIN, Jan. 2.—A constable and a civilian were killed and at least five other persons were wounded in a disturbance last night at Ballybay, County Monaghan. Fighting commenced when a police patrol of four men was fired on, two of them being wounded. Three men coming to their assistance also were fired on resulting in the death of Constable Malone, and wounding of another policeman. In continuation of the fight one civilian was killed and several wounded.
