FIRST TO TEACH PHILOSOPHY

Honor is Accorded Thales, Who Established a School Which Bore Wide Influence.

The first school of philosophy was established in Miletus (Asia Minor) by Thales, one of the wise men and was quite a remarkable institution, exerting an influence for more than a century.

Thales seems to have given himself more entirely to this school than to any of his other undertakings. There is a legend that he never married, and when his mother pressed him to do so he said, "It is not yet time. My youth was passed, and I am now old, and I am not yet rich."

Many of the subjects taught in his school, such as astronomy, geometry and geography, show the influence of Egypt and Phoenicia; but the philosophy was probably an original product, for while some of the sciences were somewhat advanced, the philosophy was apparently a first attempt at an explanation of the origin of the world.

It originated a movement which culminated more than a century later in the idealism of Plato. We may perhaps understand something of the attitude of the school of philosophy toward Thales' school of philosophy from the story of the old woman who laughed when the master fell backward into a ditch after gazing too long at the stars. The old woman not only laughed, but she is said to have called after him: "If you cannot see what is under your feet, how can you understand what is in heaven?"

The geography and astronomy taught in this school were very primitive. The earth was flat, the sun circled around it horizontally, being concealed at night by high hills. One writer of the time describes the world in the following poetical way: "God makes a mantle, large and fair and embroiders on it earth and ocean and ocean's dwellings."

DIFFERENT KINDS OF SPEED

Aviator and Motorist Didn't Have the Same Kind of Comparison as They Traveled.

The motorist was taking an aviator friend, recently returned from the army air service, out for a spin. 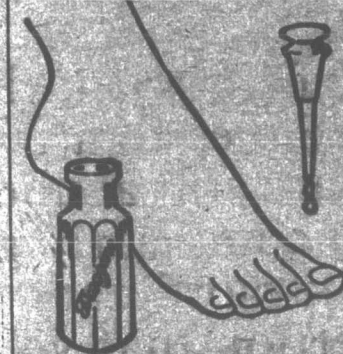

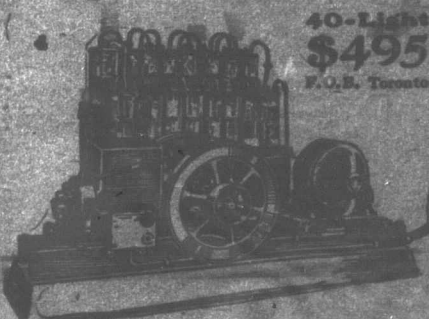

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WHOLESALE POISONING OF CATTLE

Accusals of Lead-Cause Death—Man Arrested Charged with Crime—Sent Up to Higher Court—Sheriff Foster Makes Arrest.

Harry Smith was before Police Magistrate Comben, Monday, charged with poisoning ten head of cattle belonging to Charles James. Three of the animals are dead and it is expected that the others will also die. A short horn bull, valued at three hundred dollars, was the first to succumb to the poison, which was found to be arsenic of lead. It had been scattered in a pasture just over the line fence, that divided the lands of Smith and James. The ground had traces of the poison which indicated that it had been scattered for a distance of twenty-five feet and almost entirely licked up by the cattle. During the examination it developed that on a previous occasion James had lost ten sheep by poisoning, and Smith was accused of the crime, and, owing to certain conditions, James settled the matter. Smith was arrested by Sheriff Foster and is apparently unconcerned about the trial, and although in a position to do so he does not require the services of a lawyer, and does not propose to employ one. He was sent up for trial.

LIQUOR FINES OF MORE THAN \$3,000

Inspector on North-Western Boundary Have been Busy and Magistrate's Court in Edmundston Has Reaped a Harvest.

Allan McLaughlin of Grand Falls and his sub-inspectors, Messrs. Melanson, Picard and Daigle, have been active again in Madawaska county during the past week. Several offenders against the prohibitory law have been taken before Magistrate Michaud at Edmundston, who assessed fines totalling more than \$3,000. The inspectors have seized more than 200 gallons of liquor in the county at various points. It requires vigilance night and day in Madawaska to head off the individuals who endeavor to run in liquor from over the border in Quebec province. All the runners are not by any means residents of Madawaska county. Some are residents of Maine and others belong to Quebec. The inspectors in that section of this province have been more successful for some time in arresting the illegal liquor traffic than have the officers on the Maine side, where there is much longer frontier to guard.
