EAST LEADS WEST FOR HOCKEY TITLE

Ottawa's Victory Fourth of Seven Decisive Series Won by the East.

Ottawa's victory over Seattle at Toronto in the deciding game of the Stanley cup series put the East in the lead over the West in the number of world's series titles won.

The series was the eighth meeting between representatives of the East and the West, and up to last year each of the two leagues had broken even. The 1919 series was unfinished, Canadians being tied with Seattle with two games each and the first not being played because of flu breaking out in the camp of the two teams; the late mentioned Joe Hall being fatally attacked while Malone, Lalonde and other players were seriously ill.

This year's series was thus the rubber meeting. Ottawa won the first two and the last game, and in the total scoring led by 15 to 11 goals, there being a smaller number of goals scored than in any series since 1914, as the following record of world's series games since they were inaugurated in 1913 shows:

Seattle went completely to pieces in the last twenty minutes and Ottawa ran in five straight goals.

Seattle never gave up trying until Darragh scored the fourth goal. They fought a gallant battle until they had not been injured might have won the title. All of the Ottawa players showed splendid form but Jack Darragh stood out as their star effort in the last few minutes, he tallying no less than four of the goals.

Chances were considered bright that Seattle would break the jinx that has always pursued the visiting team on Stanley cup matches but for the twentieth time the teams ran true to form.

Former American Leaguer Died in Detroit—Boston Opinion McGraw's Giants

"McGraw's team looks better to me by far than a year ago. Then his entire infield, with the single exception of Fletcher at short, looked to be on the ragged edge. His pitching staff was none too good. Now he has a star third sacker in Frank Frisch, a young fresh from Fordham. At short Fletcher is holding forth, still a star. At second there is the weakness in George Kelly at first there is a mighty big target, a remarkable thrower, a fair batter and one of the type that is likely to come rapidly once he acquires a little confidence through success.

The outfield, with Burns, Kuff, Stutz and Young, is the best in the National League. The catching ought to be taken care of with Earl Smith. Frank McCarthy, Frank Snyder and possibly Mike Gonzales.

"But it is in pitching that McGraw has a bulge on any other National League team, even Cincinnati and the Cubs, in my opinion. Art Nehf is worth the \$40,000 the Braves received for him. He is the best left-hander in the old league. The Fred Toney, Phil Douglas, Jess Barnes and Rube Benton on the staff of fingers and you have some class in the pitching department.

"If the Giants had a fair young second sacker and if Matty, the coach, had been just a trifle more successful with various pitchers he has handled, I'd flip the Giants to win the N. L. flag hands down. As it is, they're contenders, sure."
