THE REV. DR. CHINIQUEY.

HOME FROM HIS TRAVELS IN EUROPE—SOME OF HIS EXPERIENCES.
 The Rev. Dr. Chiniquey is a surprise. To the athletic young man of this day, a gentleman of fifty is considered virtually "out of it." But Dr. Chiniquey in his eighty eighth year, has no such idea. "I am a business man, sir," he said this morning when talking about his visit to Europe. "I went to Europe on business, and I transacted my business, and I was blessed of God, and here I am back again in my beloved Canada."
 "No, I did not go to Rome. I did not require to go there, because I had work elsewhere that had to be done. There was nothing there that I wanted specially to see. I was in France, Germany, Holland, and of course in England and Scotland."
 "Let me tell you, Holland is first above all things and above them all in my education and agriculture. When I was nearly every place I went the people talked quite good French and English. When I spoke at Maastricht, where I was in Germany, it was in English; and they understood me, of course."
 "I saw beautiful fields in England, splendid agricultural effects in Scotland and delightful gardens in Ireland. My dear sir, Holland is beyond us all. In his enthusiasm Dr. Chiniquey spread his arms out and his face beamed at the recollection of his visit to the splendid land of the Netherlands. He then went on: "These Holland people have said to me, 'You shall come no further' and they have helped themselves about with dykes, so that while the sea and the waves roll and roar away up overhead, they are themselves safe in their fertile valleys which bloom with plenty."
 "You never saw anything like the reception the Scotch people gave me in my controversy with the Roman Catholics at Oban. The hall was crowded, and as I had been challenged to produce the myses as to the Roman Catholic Church putting the blessed Virgin before our Saviour, there was some English and French, the respective departments of the Scotch people, and the truth of my statement, I proved it; and (here Dr. Chiniquey showed the passage) that I should be able to prove the truth of a scene of cheering. My antagonist left the scene, after gathering up his books and papers."
 "There was a great scene. The papers published cartoons showing Dr. Chiniquey knocking out his priestly antagonist. These were posted all over the country, and they were as large as the ordinary posters."
 "Yes, we were in France, among Frenchmen. They are many Protestants in some places whose parishes are Protestant. They knew of my work in Canada, and they were curious to see me very warmly. It was curious to note the difference between the poor, small sized Frenchman and the large, robust German. In physique the latter were remarkable. In education they are second to the people of Holland only."
 "The one period of unrecorded idleness Dr. Chiniquey had, when for several months he lay ill in England. He was attended to by his doctor, but 'God spared me, and I am here again in my beloved Canada, strong and hearty, and ready for work,' said Dr. Chiniquey, and the manner in which he emphasized these words by gesture and expression was full of youthful, sparkling enthusiasm. His trip home across the ocean has evidently not hurt his health or impaired his vigor.—Witness."

THE KOLAPORE CUP.
 THE VICTORIA TEAM WIN—CANADA A GOOD THIRD.
 LONDON, July 16.—In the competition for the Kolapore cup at Bideley today, open to teams from the colonies, with seven rounds each at distances of 200, 500 and 600 yards, there were ten entries. Victoria won with a total of 777; New Zealand second, with 748; and Canadian team third, with a total of 735.
 The following are the individual scores of the Canadian team: Bradburn 28, 23, 21, 25; Capt. Davidson 31, 33, 29; Laing 29, 32, 30; King 28, 31, 31; Drysdale 31, 34, 31; Windall 34, 29, 32.

A NEW MONTH FOR VICTORIA.
 The most recent idea for the celebration of the sixtieth anniversary of the Queen's accession to the throne merely involves the changing of the calendar by dividing the year into thirteen months, instead of twelve, and naming the extra one thus acquired Victoria. The genius who originated this scheme proposes that the old calendar months be reduced to twenty-eight days each, and that the month of Victoria be given twenty-nine days, leap years being arranged for as formerly by allowing February one extra day every four years. By this arrangement the calendar would stand thus:
 Present Calendar. Jan. 31, Feb. 28, March 31, April 30, May 31, June 30, July 31, Aug. 31, Sept. 30, Oct. 31, Nov. 30, Dec. 31.
 Proposed Calendar. Jan. 28, Feb. 28, March 28, April 28, May 28, June 28, July 28, Aug. 28, Sept. 28, Oct. 28, Nov. 28, Dec. 28.
 The innovator points out that he puts in the month of Victoria between June and July, because he is thus able to bring in eighteen anniversaries of importance to England in the twenty-nine days. Thus the new month would begin on the anniversary of the battle of Waterloo, June 18 being the old date, the second Victoria would be the anniversary of the signing of Magna Charta, the third, that of the Queen's accession to the throne, and the fourth, that of the birth of a possible king, the Duke of York's eldest son; the seventh would be mislabeled day the eighth, the anniversary of the coronation of Queen Victoria, and the eleventh, that of the coronation of Queen Victoria, and so on.

CANADIANS AT BISLEY.
 TORONTO, July 22.—Col Windatt of the Royal Grenadiers won the first prize of £20 in the Duke of Cambridge match, today making a score of a possible 90 at 900 yards. Lieut. Ross scored 46, and Sergt. Broadhurst 34. Blair has won a place in the last stage of the Queen's prize. Capt. White 14th Batt. Corp. Kerr 8th Highlanders Lieut. Ross 12th Batt. and Sergt. Blair are the Canadians, who did not qualify for the third stage of the Queen's cup but the prizes started for aggregates made over the first and second stages. The aggregates are given after each name: Sergt. Corrigan, 30th, 204; Sergt. Broadhurst, Royal Scots, 203; Lieut. Davidson, 8th Royal Rifles, 202; Trooper Langstroth, 8th Hussars, 201; Capt. Davidson, 8th Royal Rifles, 200; four pounds each. Lieut. Stuart, Vancouver, 200; Private Simpson, Royal Grenadiers, 197, three pounds each.
 In the "Alexandria" match, ranges 500 and 600 yards, seven shots each, Sergt. Broadhurst aggregated 67, Capt. White, 14th Batt. Lieut. Carter 33rd Batt. Sergt. Drysdale, Prince of Wales Rifles each scored well get prizes.
 In the Kynoch match, range 900 yards, ten shots, Sergt. Blair shoots off with a British competitor the second prize of three pounds and 600 rounds of ammunition. Lieut. Stuart, of Vancouver, shoots off with a fourth prize of a pound and 250 cartridges. These ties will be decided tomorrow. The Canadians are well well.
 Bisley, Eng. July 23.—Star Cable of a hundred riflemen who shoot in the Queen's prize tomorrow, the highest aggregate is 219. Canadians in the band are Kerr, 214, White, 213, Ross 211 and Blair, 206. The Canadian prizes up to today are over \$1,600.

H. H. PITTS, M. P. P.
 AT THE BELFAST ORANGE CELEBRATION.
 Dr. Hermann H. Pitts, (New Brunswick), was then called upon to say a few words to introduce Dr. the Honorable N. Clarke Wallace (Canada). Pitts said he had the pleasure three years ago of standing on the platform of Drummond with Dr. William Johnston (Cher)—and now after an interval of three years he came back again to Ireland carrying with him the hearty greetings of his Canadian brethren, who were that day celebrating the anniversary of the glorious victory of the Boyne. They were united with them in honoring that memorable battle, and in honoring the memory of the brave soldiers who fought at Aughrim and the Boyne, and who as a result of their faithfulness to the British flag had their names inscribed on the Roll of Honor of the generation of the civil and religious liberty they enjoyed. (Cheers.) They in Canada had their battles to fight against Roman Catholics, but they also had their William Johnstons, who were ready to give up position and emoluments rather than go back upon the Protestant religion. The speaker proceeded to allude to the Manitoba school question, and especially to the action of Mr. Wallace, who, though a member of the Conservative Government then in power, threw up his portfolio rather than support their retrograde policy. When the day of election came the Orangemen rose and voted for the Conservative Government, and rather than put at the head of affairs a Protestant who was willing to cater to Roman Catholics, they put in a Roman Catholic who catered to Protestants. Now they had Sir Wilfrid Laurier at the head of affairs, and if he catered to Rome they would put him out, too. (Cheers.) The Orangemen of Canada were the backbone of Protestantism in that country. They believed in the Union Jack—(hear, hear)—and they would fight for their Queen and country and for their Protestant religion. (Cheers.) He had now great pleasure in introducing to them the William Johnston of Canada—Dr. Clarke Wallace. (Cheers.)
