

CONTRACT OF THE CATARACT.

Company Submits a Draft to City Council. Adopts Monthly Peak Load as Its Basis.

Gives City Option of \$16 or 10 per cent Under Hydro.

There is little prospect of the power question being settled by the council for another week. The city has received from the Cataract Power Company a contract, embodying its offer to supply power at ten per cent. less than the Hydro Commission, but the aldermen have had so little time to go into the matter that Mayor Stewart does not think they are sufficiently familiar with it to deal with the matter at the special council meeting which he was instructed to call for to-night.

The Cataract's contract is worded very similar to the one which the Government is asking the municipalities to sign. One new concession, and a very important one, which should remove a lot of objection, has been made by the company. It agrees to supply the city on the twenty-minute maximum amount of the peak load for the month instead of by the year. Great objection was taken by the aldermen to the company basing the charge on the peak load for the year. Mayor Stewart, when asked to-day if this was likely to change his views on the matter, said he had not time to go into the contract, and was not ready to express an opinion yet.

Under the agreement the company undertakes to at any time after the date of this contract supply fifteen hundred (1,500) horse power, or, as a minimum, 40 per cent. less, ready for distribution at approximately 2,200 volts either two or three phase, and at approximately sixty-six and two-thirds cycles per second frequency.

At the expiration of a three months' written notice, which may be given by the city from time to time during the currency of the agreement, the company agrees to supply from time to time to the city in addition to the said 1,500 horse power, such amounts as may be required up to a further 1,500 horse power, making a total amount of three thousand horse power.

So long as the city faithfully observes the provisions of the agreement, the company will, upon the conditions, for the purposes and within the limits hereinafter stated, to the terms set forth and for the city at its distributing station for a term of five years, beginning on the date of the first use of power, hereunder, electric current to the amount of 1,500 horse power, such current to be available for use at all hours every day of the year; and the city agrees to use and pay for the said current the fixed sum of sixteen dollars per horse power per annum, as required at the greatest twenty minute maximum demand for said current, in accordance with and subject to the terms set forth in clause 14. Provided, however, that such twenty minute maximum demand for said current shall not include or be based upon any emergent or abnormal demand caused by purely exceptional circumstances or conditions, and not arising from the ordinary use of power as mentioned, which abnormal increase shall be specially dealt with from time to time as the occasion may arise.

Provided, however, and it is hereby agreed, that instead of the said \$16 per horse power as aforesaid, the city shall at any time have the right or option to readjust the amount to be paid by the city for power set forth in this paragraph, on the basis of ten per cent. less than the amount that will be charged by the Hydro-electric Commission of the Province of Ontario to any city, town or municipal corporation west of Hamilton or to the terms set forth in clause 14. Provided, however, that any difference in the cost of transmission; provided, however, that the said cost to such other city or town shall include all items of cost, but shall not include payments to sinking fund for repayment of original cost of transmission plant, and the amount of any difference between the city and company as to the price per horse-power, to be arrived at on the said basis, it is agreed that the same shall be calculated and settled on the said basis by the said Hydro-Electric Commission or the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board.

Provided further that in the event of the price for power under this agreement being fixed as aforesaid on the basis of ten per cent. less than the said rates of the Hydro-Electric Commission, the city agrees to pay for three-fourths of the power supplied and held on reserve from the date this contract takes effect and upon notice or notices for further supply of power from time to time whether the said power is taken or not, and when the greatest amount of power taken for twenty consecutive minutes so supplied and held in reserve to pay for this greater amount during that entire month, and when the power factor of the greatest amount of power taken for said twenty minutes falls below ninety per cent. the city shall pay for ninety per cent. of said power, divided by the power factor.

All payments for current to be made on or before the fourteenth day of each month at the company's office for the calendar month immediately preceding such charge for power to commence from the time the same is required and used. The city agrees to begin its use of power within twelve months from the date of this agreement.

The current is to be measured on the main supply circuit at a point near the entrance to the building to be used as the city's distributing station, in volt amperes, 746 volt amperes constituting a horse power.

The current is to be supplied at the exterior of the city's distributing station, and the city agrees to begin its use and pay for the power within ninety days after the company has its plant complete for the supply of power at such distributing station.

The motors and all wiring and appliances within the distributing station, except as otherwise specified, shall be provided by the city, and shall be installed in a manner satisfactory to the Canadian Board of Fire Underwriters.

The city shall also provide (unless one of the company's substations is used by the city) suitable space supports and housings for the transformers or other appliances that may be installed by the company.

The power is to be exclusively used for operating motors and electric lights and nothing else, which motors and lights shall be suitable to the system in use by the company, and shall be subject to the company's approval before being connected, and only for the purpose of the city's own business; and the city shall not disturb, rent, sell or make any use thereof or of the power herein contracted for, except as herein provided.

The company is to provide such reserve machinery (including two transmission lines to its generating station at Power Glen and a steam auxiliary plant), as will insure as nearly as is practicable a continuous supply of power, but shall not be liable for damages, nor be in default for non-commencement or interruption of supply due to accidents.

In case the supply of electric current should be interrupted for one or more hours consecutively, by any cause or reason for which the city by its officers, agents or servants is not responsible, the city shall be entitled to a pro rata abatement of the power for the time during such period. The city shall at all reasonable times allow the authorized employees of the company access to the said distributing station of the city for the purpose of inspection and repairs and measurement.
