

of this county, the American Consul did not, at the case of the Winchester at Halifax, interfere, but left the matter entirely to the disposal of the local authorities.

Mullins and Munroe were arrested, and on Monday morning were brought up for examination before Justice Primrose, Hookin and Rose. On the testimony of Capt. Handy, Mr. Cook, the pilot, and Dr. Johnston, who attended the deceased, Mullins was remanded to jail, to await his trial at the approaching term of the Supreme Court, for manslaughter.

Munroe, who attempted an assault with a knife on the pilot when the latter was about leaving the brig, was ordered to find surety for his good behavior for six months, and was imprisoned in default of bail.

Deceased was a young man named Spooner, and said to belong to New Bedford. Liquor is said to have been the sole cause of the fatal quarrel.—Pictorial Chronicle.

The Halifax Journal says that "a Mr. McDonald of Nine Mile River, aged 104 years, found his arm so little weakened by a century's use that he was able to mow a portion of his field last month."

A correspondent of the New York Courier and Enquirer, writing from France, avers, as a common opinion in England and France, that the British are still suffering from the troubles in Persia and India.

Horicultural Exhibition.—The Semi-Annual Exhibition of the Horticultural Society was opened yesterday, and afforded considerable gratification to those who take an interest in the advancement of the resources of the Island in this particular department.

The day being remarkably fine for the season, large numbers of persons from all parts of the surrounding country flocked into Charlotte, and gave to our City quite an extraordinary appearance, although the weather was very oppressive.

Among the horses exhibited were some very fine animals, but the number by no means equal to the amount of the exhibition. Some very fine horses and fillies were exhibited, and seemed to attract the principal share of attention.

The show of fruit was such as to convince even the most sceptical that nothing but care and attention are wanting, to enable the Farmers of the Island to supply the home market, at least with better fruit than we are generally in the habit of importing.

The season is rather too far advanced to expect the splendid show of flowers that would have met the eye a month since. There were enough, however, to prove that there is a growing and increasing taste for the cultivation of flowers, both in the open air and in the conservatory.

The result of the Exhibition was highly gratifying to the public, as well as to the members of the Society.—Mon.
