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Our Ottawa Letter.

To the Editor of the Star. The Resolutions of the Tariff changes continue to occupy the attention of the House and some good speaking has been done on both sides. The Speeches of Patterson (Bram) and Robertson (Hamilton) in the interest of the opposition and Government respectively have been, as yet, the most forcible. White (Cardwell) will follow on Tuesday and as he is a Statistician besides being a good speaker a lengthy effort is looked for. It is expected that the Debate will be terminated on Tuesday, but it is hardly probable that such will be the case, although it is the desire of the Government that it should be. The House will adjourn on Wednesday until the Tuesday following and as this will permit members from Ontario and Quebec making a visit home, the privilege will no doubt be taken advantage of by many. Committee, composed of equal numbers of Senators and Members of the Commons is being formed with a view to the amalgamation of the Departments of the Law Offices of each House and also that of the Translators' Departments. It is expected that if this arrangement is carried out, it will prove the initiative to other changes of the same nature in the Journal's Office, Post Office, Reading Room, &c., and there is no doubt but that the changes are in the direction of economy. Feelings of surprise and indignation have been awakened here at the intimated disposal of the Government grant for the relief of the distress in Ireland, and I am anxious to know what action will be taken by the Government in the matter. It will be an interesting calculation for us Canadians to ascertain how many votes may be controlled by the Beconsfield party in Ireland with our money, in the event of the money being applied, as intimated by Sir Michael Hicks Beach. St Patrick's Day at Memramcook. To the Editor of the Star.

Sir, - St Patrick's Day has just been celebrated at St Joseph's. For some time past the Irish students in the higher English classes have been doing their utmost to observe this feast in a manner corresponding to its importance. Inflamed with the truly noble and generous impulses of their race and anxiously awaiting an opportunity of expressing their sympathy with their suffering countrymen, they cordially responded to the touching appeal of the Nun of Kenmare. We are pleased to be able to say that their success was as great as their enterprise was laudable. The fact of the programme being entirely English and that the proceeds were to be sent to the famine-stricken Irish, gave a new zest to the evening's entertainment and secured one of the most refined and appreciative audiences ever assembled within the walls of our Alma Mater. Up to 7.30 p. m., the throng continued to pour into the Exhibition Hall of the College, and in which were seen many of the familiar faces of our graduates of Moncton, St-Joville and neighboring towns. The Hall itself was decorated with exquisite taste. Over the stage was the inscription, chaste yet neat: "I was hungry and ye gave me to eat." The walls were covered in gay profusion with mottoes and evergreens, the whole forming a very charming appearance, and finely set off with numerous engravings of Ireland's most distinguished celebrities. The programme consisted of a variety of songs, and a recitation of the "Ireland and Her Sons," and in truth he treated it in a masterly manner. Dwelling with warmth on the heroic heroes whom he exhibited, he held his auditors spell-bound, and led them back in imagination to the palm days of Ireland's prosperity. With a laudable pride he extolled the virtues of his ancestors; and his fine exterior, eloquent delivery and clear ringing voice gained him hosts of friends. On concluding he retired amid rounds of well-merited applause. His oration is said to be one of the best ever delivered on the College rostrum.

Several pieces of music being excellently rendered, a drama in three acts, entitled: "The Cross of St. John's," was next in order. It would be idle to go into any detailed personal criticism. Every individual taking part eclipsed any former, and reflected immense honor on himself, no less than on the institution which nurtures him. The second act was a gambling saloon in Paris, and the classical elegance of the costumes, the intense excitement of the players, and the sword fight and tragic ending rendered it highly interesting throughout. In the 3rd act, the court scene, the noble defence of the innocent young clerk, the representation of thunder and lightning, and finally the back-burned and the were in turn well rendered. The drama was eminently successful, and it seemed to us that each of the students had a proper conception of his part, and strenuously avoided the faults so common to amateurs.

A tablean, "Erin as She Is," was next represented. The rising of the curtain revealed the form of Erin, sad indeed, but in the pale, flickering light her countenance wore an aspect of beauty, the nobility of which was enhanced by her patience in misfortune. An angel was presenting to her the chalice of suffering, while St. Patrick, ever mindful of his children was disapproving the back-ground, anxiously surveying the interest of her beautiful in its various respects, it was a graphic and suggestive emblem of Erin's present state. Prof. Ringette in his inimitable style then favored the audience with some genuine Irish music. Too much praise cannot be given to the efforts of his efforts to furnish airs and melodies suitable to the occasion, and to his success only those who were present can testify. A beautiful melody of Irish air was played by the College orchestra, and an interesting act I voluntarily called up the Celtic bards of former days and rejoiced in the perpetuation of a music whose equal no country has ever produced. "Do ye know me now?" undoubtedly the best farce ever given here, was the next feature of the evening. All the various performers gained new laurels for themselves, particularly "Dumps," (J. Boden), the "family" man, whose doleful account of his numerous "miseries" was perfectly irresistible, and "Watwell," (T. Roche) who distinguished himself in the role of a smart English waiter. During the rendition of the farce the actors were frequently interrupted by loud bursts of laughter from the audience who highly relished the annihilation of "Jo-Jo."

The grand tablean, "Erin as she will be," was the most successful one of the evening. A magnificent burst of light displayed Erin standing on a crown, her fair form encircled with a crown, and her form enveloped in all the regal splendor of the halcyon days of Ireland's history. By her side stood an angel offering her a splendid bouquet of roses. In the rear waved the folds of that flag whose escutcheon was never tarnished by dishonor's stain, the gallant flag of Erin. "St. Patrick's Day" played by the College Band, concluded, according to the unanimous verdict of those who were present, the most pleasing and most successful entertainment ever held at St. Joseph's. The members of St. Patrick's Academy being called for, A. D. Richard, Esq., of Dorchester, moved a vote of thanks to these young gentlemen who had provided for them such an interesting evening. The Rev. Father Lafebvre made some welltimed remarks in his usual good style, and expressed himself highly pleased with the entire performance. The collection amounted to more than forty dollars, which sum, we understand, will be forwarded to the Nun of Kenmare. We cannot too highly compliment the members of the St. Patrick's Academy for the very gratifying results of their entertainment, and we trust that this is but the initiatory step to future exhibitions. We cannot conclude without paying a tribute of praise to Mr. A. B. O'Neill, C. S. C., moderator of the Academy, to whose untiring exertions the success of the entertainment is mainly owing. 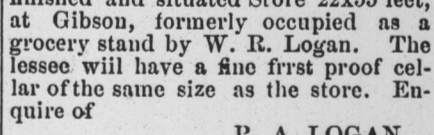
