**SIR CHARLES TUPPER.**  
THE BRITISH COLUMBIA PRESS REGARD  
HIM AS THE CHAMPION OF THAT  
PROVINCE.

The Montreal Gazette of August  
27th, says:—The visit of the hon. Min-  
ister of Railways and Canals to our city  
is, we trust, the commencement of a new  
era in our existence. It marks the ar-  
rival of a railway construction at the in-  
stant, it is well known that the Canadian  
Pacific Railway Company will push on  
construction until the whole line is com-  
pleted from ocean to ocean, it implies  
that the work on the railway will be un-  
der way until the whole is in running  
order. For us British Columbians it  
means the inauguration of business in  
this Province, which will go on increas-  
ing until this district will be great centre  
of commerce. Sir Charles Tupper de-  
serves our best consideration as a gen-  
tleman of great ability, and next to Sir  
John Macdonald, the ablest statesman in  
Canada. But in gratitude we owe him  
a great deal for the able manner in  
which he negotiated the bargain with  
the syndicate, and in the face of deter-  
mined opposition, carried the measure  
through the House of Commons. We  
in British Columbia have very little idea  
of the difficulties he had to contend with  
or the influence that were brought to  
bear in order to frustrate the design; no  
least of which was the strong prejudice  
evoked against this province. Thus he  
not only secured the railway for us, but  
became our champion and defender.

The school population in the United  
States in 1879 is set down at 14,782,  
765. The number of children enrolled in  
the public schools is 9,328,000; at  
attendance 5,223,000. Thirty-two  
States report 104,842 male, and 141,161  
female teachers. The public school in-  
come of all the States was \$62,767,815,  
and thirty States report a per centum  
of \$110,264,434. The  
average paid to women teachers in New  
Hampshire is \$12.83 per month, in  
Nevada it is \$8.3. Male teachers re-  
ceive on an average of \$25.54 in  
South Carolina, to \$34.46 in Nevada,  
and \$69.47 in the District of Columbia.  
In Maryland the two sexes have the same  
average pay, \$43.50 per month, while  
Massachusetts pays a monthly average of  
\$67.44 to the men, and but \$33.50 to  
the women.

The docks of London and Liverpool  
are wonderful. There is nothing on the  
side of the water to compare with them.  
The first commercial docks—those at  
Rotherhithe—have the date of 1650  
given them. At the beginning of this  
century, however, the real start was  
given, when the West India docks were  
opened and the first West Indian em-  
porium, decorated with the colours of the  
nation of Europe. The tidal basin, the  
Canada docks, and others at Deptford,  
at least to the energy with which London  
is supplemented the Thames.

**BYE LAWS**  
-OF THE-  
**Board of Health**  
DISTRICT OF THE TOWN  
OF CHATHAM.

1st—Every owner occupant or person  
having charge of property within the  
jurisdiction of this Board, who shall suf-  
fer from any sickness, source of filth or  
cause of sickness, shall be liable to a  
penalty not exceeding Forty Dollars,  
for each and every offence.

2nd—No person shall bury any dead  
horse or other animal within the limits  
of the Board of Health District of the  
Town of Chatham, and any horse or  
other animal dying within the limits of  
the said limits, three feet below the surface  
of the ground twelve hours after such  
death.

3rd—Sale of fresh fish within the  
limits of the Board of Health District of  
the Town of Chatham N. B.—Between  
the first day of April and the first day of  
November every year, no person shall  
sell or offer for sale within the limits of  
the Board of Health District of the Town  
of Chatham any cod, halibut, pollock,  
haddock, lake, chad or bass until the  
same shall have been cleaned of their  
entrails and refuse parts and such entrails  
and refuse parts shall be kept in some  
tight vessel until the same shall be  
thrown into the river beyond low water  
mark, which shall be done within twenty  
four hours after the said fish shall have  
been so cleaned.

4th—Sale of Meats and Poultry  
within the Limits of the Board of  
Health District of the Town of Chatham:  
No person or persons who ever shall  
sell or expose for sale any bad or un-  
wholesome meat, poultry or other pro-  
visions within the jurisdiction of this  
Board, under a penalty not exceeding  
Twenty Dollars for each and every of-  
fence, and such unwholesome meats of  
fered for sale shall be destroyed.

5—REFUSE SUBSTANCES.  
No person, without the license of this  
Board shall throw into or leave in or  
upon any street, highway, square, lane,  
alley, wharf, public enclosure, vacant  
lot, or any pond or body of water within  
the limits of the Board of Health Dis-  
trict of the Town of Chatham any dead animal,  
dirt, hair, shreds, oyster, clam or lobster  
shell, waste water, rubbish or filth of  
any kind, refuse, animal or vegetable or  
offensive matter whatsoever; nor shall  
any person throw into or leave in and  
upon any dock, slip, beach, sands or flats  
within the said limits of the Board of  
Health District of the Town of Chatham  
any dead animal, or any foul or offensive  
matter, or refuse matter, or any other  
matter to remain in any cellar or upon  
any lot or vacant grounds by him owned  
or occupied.

6—If any of the substances mentioned  
in the preceding Bye Law shall be thrown  
or carried from any store, warehouse, shop,  
cellar, yard or other place, as well  
as the occupant thereof and the person  
who actually threw, carried or left the  
same, shall severally be liable for a  
violation of this Bye Law.

**OTHER CROWDED AND INSUFFICIENT  
Dwellings.**  
7—Whenever, upon due examination,  
it shall appear to the Board that the  
number of persons occupying any tenement  
or building is so great as to be the  
cause of nuisance, sickness, or the  
source of filth; or that any tenements  
or buildings are not furnished with sufficient  
privies, notice shall be given to the oc-  
cupant or any of them requiring them  
to remove from and quit such tenement  
or buildings within such time as the  
Board shall deem reasonable, or to the  
owner or occupants, requiring such  
privies to be supplied, and such notice  
shall be respectively and forthwith com-  
plied with.

**PIGS AND COWS.**  
8—No more than one pig or more  
than two cows shall be kept on the same  
premises within the limits of the said  
Board of Health. District without a license  
from this Board, and only in such  
manner as they shall direct; and for any  
violation of this Bye Law the party of-  
fending shall be liable to a penalty not  
exceeding Twenty Dollars nor less than  
Four Dollars for each and every offence.

**SLAUGHTER HOUSES.**  
9—Whoever shall use any erection,  
building or place, within the limits of the  
Board of Health District of the Town of  
Chatham as a slaughter house, or for  
the purpose of slaughtering animals,  
shall be liable to a penalty not more  
than Forty Dollars, nor less than Two  
Dollars, for every day the offence is  
committed within the said limits.

**RIGHT SOIL.**  
10—No person shall remove any  
right soil from any privy or other place,  
within the jurisdiction of this Board,  
without a license from the Board (which  
License shall specify the time when the  
same may be removed) under a penalty  
not exceeding Twenty Dollars for each  
offence.

**SMALL POX OR INFECTIOUS DISEASE.**  
11—When any householder shall  
know that any person within his family  
is taken sick of the small pox, or any  
other disease dangerous to the public  
health, he shall immediately give notice  
of the existence of such disease to the  
Board of Health, and if he shall refuse or
