Municipal Farm for York Co.
The question of establishing a municipal farm was discussed at York Co. Council last week, but it was decided to defer action until after the war. A majority of the councillors favor the establishment of a municipal farm, and plans to be maintained jointly by Fredericton, Marysville and the municipality of York.

I. R. C. News
Superintendent W. R. Devenish, of the Canada Eastern Branch of the I. R. C. R. was in town on Sunday. He went to Fredericton on Monday, and left on Monday afternoon in his private car on an inspection trip over the St. John Valley Railway. It is announced that Mr. Justis Underhill of Blackville, has been appointed trackmaster on the Canada Eastern Division. He succeeds Mr. Samuel Allenach, who has been transferred to the Northern Division.

A Hydro-Electric Power Proposition
The villages of Richibucto and Rexton have been incorporated as a hydro-electric power company, to dam the Kouchibouguac and generate electricity for lighting and other purposes. It is now proposed that its sphere of usefulness be extended to the Miramichi—that the dam be made high enough for a plant that will generate enough current to light Chatham and Newcastle and run our manufacturing plants as well as those of Richibucto and Rexton. Careful estimates of cost and probable revenue are being made with a view to this end.—Chatham World.

Prominent Teachers Going West
A. M. McDermott, instructor in plants and gardening at the Woodstock Summer Science School has received a telegram from Saskatchewan, offering him the direction of the agricultural work in that province. Mr. McDermott is a graduate of the Ontario Agricultural College at Guelph, and has been associated with Director R. P. Steeves at Sussex.

Mary Miles Minter

The Charming and Beautiful Young Actress at the Happy Hour

Little Mary Miles Minter, the youngest star in the world, will be seen on the screen at the Happy Hour on Thursday in "Dimples," a five part Metro wonderplay, produced by the Columbia Pictures Corporation. In this master screen production, Miss Minter is provided with a role as admirably suited to her talents as she was in "Barbara Frietchie," and "Emmy of Stork's Nest," the two most recent Metro features in which she was starred. Miss Minter is surrounded by an unusually strong supporting cast, headed by Thomas J. Carrigan, her new leading man, and including Peggy Hopkins, Ferd Tidmarsh, Charlotte Shelby, Schuyler Ladd, Harry Ford, William Raulser, William Cowper, Mae De Metz and other notable stage and screen artists.

Mr. Carrigan who will be seen with Miss Minter in many future Metro productions, is one of the finest appearing men in the silent drama. He was formerly a leading man with Belasco stage productions and scored an individual hit in "The Girl of the Golden West." "Sweet Kitty Bolairs" and other stage successes. Since his advent into motion pictures, he has been starred, also directed many feature productions. Mr. Carrigan was the leading man in the big screen production of "Cinderella," playing the role of Prince Charming, while Mabel Taliaferro, who is now also a Metro star, played the name part. The Treatment Of Diphtheria

"Modern Methods of Diagnosis and Treatment of Diphtheria," was the title of an extremely educational paper delivered by Dr. W. H. Park, Director of Laboratory, Public Health Department, New York city, before the 5th Annual Conference of the Ontario Health Officers Association in Toronto a short time ago. Dr. Park stated that his department was specializing in the matter of reducing the amount of diphtheria among children. In this connection Dr. Park pointed out that in order to carry out the practical work the department had divided certain sections of the city into medical districts and grouped the children for the purpose of making tests and at the same time, obtaining more thorough information as to the causes for the spreading of the disease.

Full Amount of Antitoxine
Dr. Park said that the scheme had been productive of wonderful results, and he urged the establishment of similar work in all large cities. In dealing with the question of antitoxine, Dr. Park said:
"It seems strange that, after twenty-one years of experimenting, the medical fraternity are still undecided as to the amount to give and the way to give it. From practical experience I feel satisfied that the full amount of antitoxine required should be given in the first injection. I think a lot of harm is done if the full amount is not given in the first injection."

With the assistance of several charts Dr. Park described its uses in various stages and the results obtained, both in the cases of children and adults at ages ranging from two to twenty-one years, and upon animals. He stated that fully seventy per cent. of horses were diphtheria carriers.
At the morning session there was a spirited debate following a paper, "Should the breadwinner be quarantined," which was given by Dr. V. A. Harro of Vespra. It was pointed out that under the law the whole matter of quarantining an individual rests with the discretion of the Medical Health Officer, except in the case of smallpox. The general opinion was that the officers do not make exemptions in cases where the breadwinner does not exercise particular care in his home.

BRITAIN STOPPING

ANOTHER LEAK
Rotterdam, July 11—The Neuve Rotterdam-Sche Courant says that Great Britain has asked Holland to stop the export of manufactured goods to neutral countries, declaring that non-compliance will result in the stoppage of Holland's cotton imports.
The Telegraph says that the allies are merely contemplating measures to prevent the export of Dutch cotton goods to Switzerland and Roumania as it has been proved that such exports really were intended for Germany.
