

Now that the councillors enter upon a two years lease of the seats instead of one as formerly, it would be wise to have the finances of the county carefully equated into, so that a clear and concise statement can be made. It is not necessary to get up a political war to have the accounts put in better shape and in justice to all it should be done. In speaking thus no reference is intended to the secretary or treasurer or auditor. As the council has been conducted there were so many changes that many cared very little whether the affairs were managed economically or the reverse. Contingencies should be guarded against, for each parish is well looked after the county will be the gainer. The public accounts committees have not taken the time which the importance of the position demands, and matters were thus passed by that would, if enquired into, paid the county well for the time spent.

In reference to a charge that William Wilson wrote or instigated articles which appeared in this journal respecting the council it is only necessary to say that such is not the fact. Mr. Wilson has not himself written nor yet furnished the facts which have appeared. Any rate payer has a right to justly criticize the conduct of affairs and that is all THE HERALD has attempted.

THE MURDER.

The murder at Keswick is so revolting in detail and so brutal in general feature that all are shocked at the idea that such an act could be possible in this province. Such deeds are generally supposed to belong to the south and western states where in many places civilization, especially among the negro population, has not made any great advancement, where morals are very lax and where the law is very man his own judge and jury.

The policy was adopted to benefit Ontario particularly and generally the other provinces. It has been a miserable failure there and must be classed as still worse here.

SOUTHAMPTON.

Sept. 26.—To begin where I left off and briefly review. Large hole, 4x6 feet, dug two feet south of "channel post," set by Colonel McLaughlin more than thirty years ago. A narrow deep ravine behind "post," at bottom of which and one rod north of "post" issues a perpetual spring. Upon diligent search it was found that no other spot in that whole vicinity had been touched by pick or spade, but the bunch of large hazel nut bushes with a poplar tree in the centre, had been cut away, and the work of sinking so deep a hole in a bed of clear gravel and small stone begun. Sept. 21.—Harvesting is now almost finished in the locality, and the work of threshing is going on in some places. Oats are turning out well, but buckwheat is deficient both in quantity and quality. Potato digging has been begun by some farmers, the crop is the best we have had here for some time, the rest has done little or no damage and the potato fields are quite green yet.

Lord and Lady Aberdeen will attend the formal opening of the new Board of Trade building at Montreal today.

During the riot against the enforcement of cholera regulations at Hamburg yesterday a policeman was trampled to death.

The police have instituted to all the London banks that a gang of expert American forgers are now on their way to London.

Armed men will accompany every train hauling express or mail cars from Chicago to any point east, west or south in the future.

Ten thousand barrels of potatoes for shipment were disposed of in Houlton last week, at an average price of \$1 per barrel.

The Maine Central R. R. Co. refuses to confer with its employees concerning the recent cut of ten per cent. in wages, and a big strike is imminent.

This week will see the beginning of the work of putting into shape a tariff bill to be reported by the United States House committee on ways and means.

The conspiracy case against N. K. Conroy and Thomas McGreevy, came up at the Ottawa assizes yesterday, and was adjourned until November 14.

A petition for the repeal of the Scott Act in Westmorland, filed with the registrar of deeds, at Dorchester on Friday last, had 2338 names attached.

Advices received from Persia, show that for two weeks past, cholera has been ravaging the towns and villages along the eastern shores of the Persian gulf.

F. S. Spence, secretary of the Dominion Alliance, has issued a circular, by order of the executive committee, calling a convention of the organization for Thursday, October 10.

Jacob Shefflin was killed at Tweed, Ont. Saturday night in a drunken row by a man named Lusks, who has disappeared. The murder was done by a heavy blow from Lusks' fist.

Dr. A. A. Stockton has received a letter from Sir Richard Webster, in which the latter has expressed his regret that he will not be able to visit eastern Canada on this trip.

All the Fall River cotton mills are running, except the American Linen and Fall River. The former will start up next Monday morning. Oakland mill started last Monday.

Rowland, amounting to three thousand dollars, have been offered for the arrest and conviction of the men who caused the dynamite explosion at San Francisco on Saturday night last.

The manganese mine situated a short distance from St. Martins has again been opened up. This time a shipping company has been formed and it is believed that a paying industry will soon be established there.

Detective Ring left Portland, Me., Wednesday, with the boy Cunningham who stole \$250 belonging to Mrs. McAfee, of Davenport, Iowa. The boy was returned to the detective by the Maine officials.
