Induction Service.

AT PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH.
The ceremony of the induction of Rev. J. S. Sutherland as pastor of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, this city, was conducted last evening at that edifice by the Rev. R. Johnston, B.A., Moderator of the Halifax Presbytery. The local clergymen who assisted him were Rev. P. S. Coffin, of Harbor Grace; Rev. J. M. Allan, of Bay of Island, and Rev. Dr. Cowperthwaite, this city. Rev. Mr. Johnston began by reading the lesson from the second chapter of Timothy. Rev. Dr. Cowperthwaite then offered prayer. The offertory followed and then came the sermon by Rev. Mr. Johnston, whose text was "Evening and morning and noon when I pray." It was a masterly effort well worthy of the occasion and one that will not soon be forgotten by the audience. The preacher dwelt on the fact that the duties of religion should be regarded in a practical and earnest manner, especially the duty of prayer and the regular attendance at Divine worship. After the sermon the induction was proceeded with. Rev. Mr. Coffin first made the formal announcement that Rev. Dr. Robertson, the late pastor, had been called to Toronto, and that the one chosen as his successor was Rev. J. S. Sutherland. The call had been sustained by the Halifax Presbytery and had been accepted by Dr. Sutherland. The new pastor acquiesced in all the conditions laid down by the Rev. Moderator. Thereupon followed addresses by Rev. P. S. Coffin and Rev. M. Allan on the pastoral duties of the new minister, who after he had closed the sermon by imparting Benediction, delivered a very learned address to the congregation. Music specially prepared for the occasion was rendered by Mr. Alfred Hall, the new organist, who made a very favorable impression on the judges of good music among the congregation.

Opinion of Canker.

Editor Evening Telegram.
Sir—A few words from the shop respecting a remark in your issue would seemingly not be unheeded, as we all are at least interested in farming. Teachers take interest, and I deem it necessary that we all should study and observe the natural everyday commonplace degradation of the land. Some time ago we were startled about the canker—a dreadful potato disease which is not half as prevalent as previously reported. Although not an expert on farm work, a few notes cannot go astray. What do your readers think of the canker? My opinion concerning the canker is this: that the canker is not in the ground; it is in the seed potatoes. These words may appear as erroneous ones, yet "experience teaches," as it surely does, and it is verified. A question asked may not be unappreciated: "How did the canker get into the ground?" It didn't fall there, and it didn't grow there. But first of all it came from the seed. In one bed in another a different kind. The first bed is not marked by the canker, while the other is. My opinion concerning the matter is that the disease comes from the diseased tubers, and after the seeds are sown a while new tubers acquire a fungus, and so the disease spreads. It is not in the soil, but in the ground so very much if when the area affected be laid down to a meadow. The canker seed should be destroyed, and it is my belief that every many years go by the canker will be a thing of the past.
Impoverished ground should not be utilized for potatoes, and if fertile ground is used, the seeds do not bring satisfactory production. I don't say that canker is nothing more or less than a potato plague.
