LONDON, March 29.

The City of Bristol, on behalf of its citizens, decided yesterday to present a descriptive tablet of John Cabot's departure from Bristol on his famous voyage of discovery of North America to the memorial tower of Halifax. A number of ladies of Bristol are adding a facsimile banner presented by Henry VIII. to Cabot.

LONDON, March 29.

Sir William Ramsay, in a speech to-night, announced that an experiment was likely to be made in the way of carrying out a suggestion made by him, opening a smoke abatement exhibition by resorting to the bowels of the earth to produce gas for power. "I firmly believe," he said, "that something will be done in not removing the coal but letting it remain underground burning there and taking off the gases from the surface. I have been in communication with a large colliery proprietor, and he is going to give me a chance of making experiments on a small scale. If they succeed, a candle may be lighted in England which will not be extinguished in our time."

NANKING, March 29.

A meeting of the suffragettes was held to-night to protest against what the speakers describe as their base betrayal by the Commons. Mrs. Despard, who was sentenced to prison in 1909, and was arrested for picketing Asquith's house, said the time had arrived for the suffragettes to adopt more effective methods. She urged a boycott. Women, she said, should not buy hats, which would hurt the workmen worse than window smashing. She declared they should not go to seaside resorts represented in Parliament by men of anti-suffragette tendencies; they should not subscribe funds for charities or institutions, nor invest their money in England.

NANKING, March 29.

The composition of Premier Tang Shao Yi's new cabinet is as follows: Foreign Affairs, Lu Cheng Hsun; Finance, Huang Hsi Ling; Navy, Lin Kwang Hsun; Army, Tuan Chi Jui; Justice, Wang Chun Hui; Communications, Liang Ju Hao; Commerce, Chen Chi Mei; Interior, Chao Ping Chun; Education, Tsai Yuan Pi; Agriculture, Sung Chiao Fen. Premier Tang in the course of his speech said that he hoped the relations of China with commerce would be developed, and that peace would quickly be restored to the country. Referring to the Chinese Budget, he said that 214,000,000 taels, approximately \$150,000,000, would be necessary for all purposes, and of this total 50,000,000 taels, or \$37,500,000, would be utilized in payment of the expenses of the war.

DISCOVERED BY MR. McGRATH.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir.—I see the Editor of the Chronicle is coming to life again, as evidenced by the mud and filthy slime which appears on the pages of that champion mud slinging paper to-night. The idea of the Editor of the Chronicle venturing into the realm of political economy science is about as incongruous a proceeding as one can well imagine. As well expect a lesson on the solar system from an Esquimo as to expect light from the Editor of the Chronicle on the subject of political economy. The writer of "Newfoundland in 1911" to have the consummate cheek to deride the reasoning of Mr. Keith shows an amount of gall on his part which is truly amazing. He must have been reading some since he wrote the travesty: "Newfoundland in 1911," for I notice some high-sounding terms copied from some work on political economy. The Editor of the Chronicle, in the world of words, is like an infant in the world of sounds. The one producing a tempest of sound laughs with glee at his booter mousie, the other, getting up a din of fine words, thinks he is giving out reason.

I think he is very dense indeed who cannot grasp the fact that when a country is importing vastly more than she is exporting she is at a great disadvantage. A citing of figures showing how the imports of Canada exceed her exports is no argument, and does not apply to our case at all. The fact of Canada being in that position is no argument against the position advanced. That a country to be truly and substantially prosperous must at least balance imports with exports. To be in a position to purchase we must have produced something that can exchange for what we require. If our requirements exceed our ability to provide these requirements we are in poverty. I think any person of any reason can see the truth of that. No internal trade has nothing whatever to do with the question in the light in which the Minister of Finance and the Chronicle would use it. That internal trade cannot be separated from our external trade, but is dependent upon it. The factors that produce that internal trade are not all sufficient but must rely on our imports and exports, just as though they were directly engaged in creating the external trade. We will take the lumber trade, because the Chronicle selects that trade as an instance in support of his illogical position. The men who produce lumber cannot directly clothe themselves in lumber, neither can they feed on boards or sawdust. They exchange their lumber for clothes and food. The grocer and the tailor give them clothes and food for their lumber; the grocer and the tailor build houses of the lumber. Another kind of exchange now takes place and the lumber is changed into money. The carpenter who builds the houses receives money in exchange for his time. The lumber, as lumber, no longer exists. The carpenter sends his money out of the country for commodities, he becomes an importer. Now you see how internal and external trade are but one trade manifesting themselves in different directions. The lumber man gives his lumber to the tailor and grocer in exchange for imported articles; the tailor and grocer hire the carpenter who converts the lumber of the tailor and grocer into time and receives money for his time or labor. The money which he receives again goes out for articles that are imported, and thus the articles of trade are made to pulsate, through all the different phases of our activity.

A newspaper article is scarcely the medium through which such tyros as the Editor of the Chronicle and our Finance Minister can be educated in the principles of political economy; therefore, I suggest that the C. H. E. should adopt a paper on that science. However even the most stupid may learn a little even though it be to respect those who have acquired knowledge.
